CANDIDATES FILE PAPERS

Last Day for Filing Causes Activity Among Candidates.—Republicans Have Some Good Men.

THE PRIMARY TICKETS.

Pursuant to the new primary law the two parties now have their tickets in the field ready for the first step toward election day. The primary election will be held on June 7. A democrat can vote for democrats only and a republican for republicans only at this first voting, which takes the place of the old time caucus and convention system.

The democrats come forward with very much the same old ticket, although there are a few ambitious ones who are trying to get back into the close corporation which rules democracy in this county.

For auditor, Mike Collins, the old timer, is being opposed by Ed Champion, a rattling good young fellow, but one who stands no show against big Mike, who expects to be auditor of

Crawford County until he dies. Champion has been putting up a game fight and Mike is beginning to sit up and take notice. Mike is running for a fifth term.

For treasurer Louie Evers will have no opposition from present indications either on the democratic or the republican ticket.

For clerk, Frank Faul is opposed by Earl D. McLaren of Manilla. Faul is one of the regular democratic bosses and will win hands down. McLaren is a fine, clean young man with a good record. He was an osteopathic physician in Denison and was known here as a man of high character. Of recent years he has suffered greatly from ill-health, and it is only recently that he has been able to engage in active work. He is too good a man for the democrats of Crawford county to nominate—and they won't do it. Faul is one of "de gang," and he will get the nomination. Faul is running for a fifth term.

For Recorder Will Terry, the present recorder, is opposed by Jim McKim of Deloit. Jim was recorder once upon a time and he was one of the most popular men ever in public office in Crawford county. Just at present, however, Terry has a good many enemies. If McKim is nominated it will not be because the democrats hate McKim less, but Terry more. Terry is running for a third term.

For sheriff Hank Cummings, having made a good record for his first term, has no opposition from either party. He is running for his second term.

For superintendent of schools, F. L. Hoffman has other plans in mind and is not a candidate. This left an opening for Prof. F. N. Olrey of Schleswig to become a candidate. He is said to be a good teacher, but he is not well known throughout the county and there is a general impression that he will not be a winner.

For surveyor the democrats have no candidate against Uncle Morris. They could not beat him, anyhow.

For county attorney the democrats have no candidate against P. J. Klinker. Same reason as above.

For coroner, W. M. Byrnes of Vail has no opposition as yet in either party.

For supervisors, the field is full, as usual. John Holland will be a candidate to succeed himself. John gets beat for supervisor every other time he runs, and this is his off year, so good-by, John.

John Carey, like the poor, we have always with us. Carey's candidacy is like one of those perpetual calendars, good for a hundred years. The name of the office changes from year to year, but John T. Carey appears in some capacity on every democratic ticket. It is more than whispered, however, that Slickery John has lost his grip to a great extent. There are many democrats who are tired of voting for him all the time and he has found it difficult to dodge as gracefully as supervisor as he has in other capacities.


Thomas Ahart has concluded to quit, and two democrats, St. Clair Butterworth of Dow City and Ed Ebert of Hanover are trying to get into his shoes. Both are representative men and they will furnish the most interesting scrap on the democratic primary ticket.

The above is an outline of the democratic ticket and its candidates.

The Republican Ticket.
It must be confessed that the republicans, knowing that they have a hard row to hoe after the primary, have not rushed forward in great numbers for places on the ticket. Nevertheless, the ticket will be a strong one and there will be more candidates than our democratic friends predicted or hoped there would be. In nearly every instance the office has sought the man on the republican ticket, and the result is that the republicans are not merely a bunch of office seekers, but good men whom their friends and neighbors have sought out as good and available men for county office.

For auditor, W. F. Staller of Washington township, one of the best known farmers of the southwest part of the county, is a candidate. He has lived in the county for thirty years and has never before been a candidate for any office.

He is well educated and highly competent. For many years he has been the republican committeeman in Washington township and the republicans of the county owe him their loyal and

heartly support. If there is sufficient dissatisfaction among the democrats with the gang rule in their party, Staller may surprise the talent by beating big Mike.

For treasurer, the republicans have no candidate.

For clerk, the republican candidate is Henry T. Bliesman, a splendid young man, of fine ability, good character and excellent education. He is the best penman in Crawford county. As a clerk of the court he would be

far and away more efficient than the present incumbent. Mr. Bliesman is the son of one of the best known and most highly respected of our German citizens. Until recently his father was a farmer in Otter Creek township, but he has now moved to Denison to take things a little easier. The republican candidate was born in Crawford, educated at Denison Normal College, and he is in every way worthy of support.

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DEATH OF A. D. HERRIG

Dies at His Home in Denison Last Thursday—Cancer of Stomach Cause of Death.

WAS A PROMINENT CITIZEN.

Funeral Was Held Monday and Interment Took Place at Wall Lake, His Old Home.

Adolph D. Herrig, a prominent German citizen of Denison, died at his home on Church street on Thursday night of last week. His death did not come as a sudden shock to either his family or the community, for his ailment was of such a nature that for some time all hope of recovery was practically abandoned. Mr. Herrig had all his life enjoyed almost perfect health up to last Christmas eve, when he was suddenly stricken, and while he soon recovered from the severity of the attack, was never a well man after that time. Early in March of this year he was taken to Colfax, where it was discovered that he was probably suffering from cancer of the stomach. He was afterward treated by Dr. Kagel of Shelby, Iowa, who diagnosed his trouble as simply catarrh of the stomach. On April 6 he was taken to Rochester, Minnesota, and placed in charge of Drs. Mayo, the famous physicians and surgeons of that place, for treatment. An incision confirmed the suspicion that the trouble was a fast growing cancer and that an operation would be useless, and after spending two weeks in the hospital Mr. Herrig was brought back to his home, where just about two weeks from the date of his return, his death occurred.

The deceased was born in the town of Kemp, in Germany, on June 4, 1839, being at the time of his death but one month short of 71 years of age. When a young man Mr. Herrig immigrated to the United States from Germany, coming direct to Davenport, Iowa, and ever since that time has resided in this state. On his arrival in this
