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THEY HONOR THE HEROES

MANY PERSONS AT EXERCISES.

Free Addresses Large Crowd in the Afternoon Rev. J. James De-Pree at the Opera House.

Decoration day was fittingly observed in Denison by appropriate services in the forenoon at the cemetery and in the afternoon at the Opera House. The program was under the auspices of John A. Logan Post of the Grand Army of the Republic, the Women's Relief Corps, W. A. McHenry Camp, Sons of Veterans, and citizens. The day was an ideal one, in spite of the fact that the sky, in the early morning was overcast with clouds, which threatened rain. But long before the time for the procession to start for the cemetery, the clouds cleared away, the sun sent forth his warm and welcome rays, which took away the chill of the morning and made it comfortable and agreeable for young and old alike to take part in the services of the day. A much larger crowd than usual was found waiting at the cemetery on the arrival of the procession, where the program, as advertised, was carried out in minute detail.

There were 31 veterans of the Civil War on the ground and the salute was fired by the seven Blackman boys, all sons of our late and honored citizen, Jerome Blackman, who answered the last bugle call a few months ago. The services at the cemetery were particularly impressive, as were the other services of the day. The principal feature of the afternoon was the address of the Rev. J. J. DePree of the Presbyterian church, delivered in the Opera House. The speaker had a strenuous day's work. He delivered the memorial address in the forenoon at Dow City, and returned in time to perform the same service at 2:30 in the Opera House here. His address was

both patriotic and interesting. In his characteristic manner he pointed out to his large and appreciative audience the importance of the observance of this sacred day; that it should be devoted to honoring the memory of the soldier dead, as well as showing our respect and devotion for those now living. The great hardships endured and sacrifices made by the soldiers in defense of the Union were graphically portrayed, as well as the inestimable value of their services in preserving the Union and ridding the nation of the accursed institution of slavery. He deplored and criticized the growing tendency on the part of some to make the day one of sports and amusements. There was a profusion of flowers at the cemetery, where the graves of the deceased soldiers were appropriately decorated. Everything conspired to make it a day long to be remembered. There was nothing provided in the way of sports during the entire day to interfere with the program being carried out in every detail, but after the services were over a game of base ball took place at the park. We are pleased to know that the people of Denison have such high regard for the properties of this sacred day that they are willing to abstain from doing anything which would in any way interfere with the program being religiously carried out. We believe in Decoration day, and that it should be continued and perpetuated even after every soldier who participated in the Rebellion is called to his final reward. Its influence on the minds of both young and old is elevating and inspiring, and as long as the grave of a Union soldier can be identified anywhere in this broad land, it should, and will, be treated as hallowed ground.

There are 84 national cemeteries in the United States, the largest of which is at Arlington in Virginia, across the Potomac river from the city of Washington. Here are buried more than 21,000 Union soldiers, among them being a large number of the prominent generals engaged in the Civil War. The next largest cemetery is at Vicksburg, Miss., where more than 16,000 soldiers are buried. The smallest one is at Ball's Bluff, in Virginia, overlooking

MORE ABOUT GOOD ROADS

Denison Gets Credit for Movement for Better Roads All Over the State of Iowa.

MR. ROLLINS TALKS AT DE WITT.

The Association to Place Sign Boards All Along the Northwestern and Paint Poles White.

The good roads campaign is not ended, nor will it be until results are secured in the way of an improvement of the highways in the state. The Denison organization originally contemplated nothing beyond the river to river road from Council Bluffs to Clinton, but the influence of the work has extended so that it is taking hold of the people throughout the entire state, with the result that the highways are being improved and put in better condition than they have ever been before. Those who originated this work builded better than they knew, and we predict they will live to see the highways in the state improved to an extent which they little dreamed of when the improvement was inaugurated. We are pleased to know that Denison is identified with this great movement and that our townsmen were pioneers in the movement. The organization which was effected, and under which the movement is now carried on, is known as the Transcontinental Route Association. Henry Haag of Jefferson is the president, W. C. Rollins of Denison the secretary, and W. F. Coan of Clinton, treasurer. One important thing which has been decided upon is to put up signboards along the entire route across the state, labelled, Iowa Official Transcontinental Route. This sign will be placed on boards, size 18x24 inches, two-inch black letters on white background with two-inch space at bottom of sign for arrow. One official sign will be placed at each section corner on post, whitewashed, not less than 12 feet high, the sign to be 8 feet from the ground, and at every cross road not on section line, one white pole without sign will be placed.

At a turn in the road all fence posts or telephone poles are to be whitewashed and the official sign is to be marked with an arrow to indicate the direction to be taken. Commencing at Clinton, each town is to place signs to the next town west on the route. Each town may have the privilege of marking more than one route to the next town west, and is to place signs in or through their own town, as they wish. Speed limit signs and danger signals are to be placed where needed. County vice presidents and town chairmen will at once secure the permission of local telephone companies to use their poles for guide boards, and, without delay, arrange their routes and whitewash the posts. Curtis Brothers & Co. of Clinton, Iowa, are donating free of expense to the association two hundred sign boards to be used along the route. Mr. Rollins, the secretary of the association, at a meeting last week at De Witt, Iowa, before an audience exceeding 1,000 people, delivered the following address:

W. C. Rollins' Address.

"Ladies and Gentlemen: I am glad to see the ladies take an interest in the good roads movement because it shows that they want them, and I know that if they want them they will get them. I know this because I have been married for ten years. "I have been interested in the movements for good roads from river to river for some time and was much pleased to be invited to address this meeting of an entire county on the subject. I earnestly hope that many other counties will follow in the footsteps of Clinton county and hold similar meetings throughout the state. People of Clinton county, I say to you, don't be jealous of the county supervisors; don't be jealous of the township trustees; but assist them in every possible manner in the furtherance of this great work. Don't be jealous of the automobile owner, for if he does not happen to own land in your township, he is paying taxes in some other place, and thus contributes his share toward the making of better roads, and in many instances he is advancing money to aid in the carrying out of many pieces of road building.

BACCALAUREATE SERMON

Eighteen Girls and Six Boys of 1910 Class Attend in Body and Hear Sermon.

DELIVERED BY REV. J. J. DePREE,

Who in a Most Earnest, Forceful and Eloquent Manner, Preaches Wonderful Sermon.

The 1910 graduating class of the Denison High School—18 girls and 6 boys—and their friends, on Sunday evening, at 8 o'clock, taxed to its very utmost the seating capacity of the Presbyterian church to hear Rev. J. James DePree preach the baccalaureate sermon.

For more than an hour, most earnestly, forcibly, eloquently, and most persuasively, he held up to the class, and to the audience, for that matter, the dire necessity of taking the strength and beauty embodied in the life of Our Lord, Jesus Christ, as their model and pattern in the life just opening up to the members of the class.

There were no devotional exercises in any other church in the city, and surely the community in its generous numbers and the rapt attention paid the preacher, was something that he could not fail to notice, and that his friends felt was something of an honor.

In beautiful rounded periods he pictured to the class the strength and beauty of the walls and pillars of Solomon's temple, which in a measure was to typify, humanly speaking, the beautiful life of our divine Redeemer.


