THOS. COSTELLO DEATH.

Prominent Citizen of East Boyer Township Dies at a Ripe Old Age.

Thomas Costello, a prominent citizen of Vall, died at his home on Friday last. Mr. Costello was born in Clare county, Ireland, in 1826 and came to America 46 years ago. He was married in Davenport, Iowa, two years later to Mary O'Donnell, where they resided a short time, and from whence they moved to St. Louis to remain but two years, after which they moved back to Davenport, then to Wheatland and later came to Crawford county in 1875, where the deceased resided until the time of his death.

It was only last October that Mrs. Costello departed this life. Mr. Costello was an upright and conscientious citizen and had a wide circle of acquaintances and friends who, with his children, mourn his loss.

The funeral services were held at St. Anne's church at Vall at ten o'clock on Sunday, Rev. Father Murphy officiating. The pallbearers were Thomas Meehan, T. Casey, P. Hanrahan, John Kearney, M. McMahon, Ed Doherty.
