



**Our 1-2 Back Pad Farm Harness**


The harness is built to meet the requirements of the trade that want a strong all-around farm harness. Bridles, 3-4 throat latch, 3-4 cheek, 3-4 check rein, 1-2 crown, 3-4 fronts, 1-2 nose band, round blinds, 1-2 winker stays. Turn back 7-8 single ply all solid stock, end of turn back 1-2 wide, split to 3-4 crupper. Hip Strap 7-8 wide, all solid stock running into solid leather lead up. Breeching, folded with 1-4 layer strap, all sewing used in the construction of the breeching is 6 inches to an inch. Breeching strap, 7-8 wide fitted with snap and buckle. Back Pad, fitted with moline tree jointed. Skirts, all solid leather folded, sewed 6 stitches to an inch. Belly Band, Folded with 1-2 layer strap, sewed 6 stitches to an inch. Lines 22 feet long, 1 inch wide, fitted with round invincible line buckle. Traces 6 feet long, 6 long double ply sewed 6 stitches to an inch, all stitches channeled into tug. Hame Tug, folded with 1-4 layer strap sewed 6 stitches to an inch. This harness complete as described, less collars, and every strap guaranteed
