DENISON WINS FIRST GAME.

High School Boys Beat the Missouri Valley Eleven by a Score of 44 to 0.

The above is the score of the first football game of the season which was played at the college grounds last Saturday afternoon between the Missouri Valley high school and the Denison high school.

From the start it was evident that the Valley boys were outclassed as Denison repeatedly bucked the line for gains, but made their big gains by going around the ends; in fact, if Denison had made more end runs it is hard to tell what the score would have been. The fumbling of the ball by Missouri Valley was very noticeable, and they lost the ball to Denison a number of times on account of it, giving Denison the advantage of having the ball most of the time—in fact, the ball was at all times in the visitors' ground and at no time was the home goal threatened.

The game was a clean one and free from slugging and in fact it was a parlor game compared with many football games. The wounded were all over their troubles and able to eat a good supper after the game. The most spectacular play of the game was Temple's fifty-yard dash around the right end for a touchdown which occurred during the first half of the game. There were many other good plays pulled off and special mention might be made of the goal kicking by Carey, the playing and judgment of Saul, and also the excellent tackle work done by Jones. All the boys played good football for the amount of practicing they have done. The team that wins from Denison this year will know that they have been in a real live game.

Denison made the first touchdown in two minutes of play and Carey kicked goal. Denison played so fast they made a score of 17 to 0 in the first quarter by bucking the line and good gains on end runs. Denison run the score up to 28 to 0 at the end of the second quarter and during the third quarter Denison only made 5 points, the score being Denison 33, Missouri Valley 0. Denison put more vim into the game and by some live football made two touchdowns and kicked goal once for a total of eleven points, making the score 44 to 0. The game ended with the pigskin on Missouri Valley's 20-yard line.

A large crowd attended the game and it was greatly enlivened by the high school yells and songs given by about thirty high school girls. The Denison team will play several games here during the season and the Denison people should make an effort to support the team by attending the games.

HENRY VOSGERAU.

Henry Vosgerau, for many years a resident of this county, departed this life at nine o'clock on Sunday morning, in Sac county, where he was temporarily living.

Mr. Vosgerau was born Oct. 2, 1834, at Dullerort-Holz, Kreis Suedor-Brarup, Schleswig-Holstein, Germany, and emigrated to America in 1869, settling in Teed's Grove, Clinton county. He was married Dec. 29, 1871, to Elsie M. Kreuger, who survives him. In 1876 he came to Stockholm township, where he purchased 200 acres of land. He sold his farm in 1898 and moved to Denison, where he lived for several years, the Denison home now being occupied by his son, Otto, who is a member of the Review force.

Mr. and Mrs. Vosgerau were victims of the great cyclone which swept through Stockholm township more than thirty years ago, destroying everything of a perishable nature upon their farm, and leaving their place a total wreck. The deceased at the time of his death was slightly over 76 years of age. He leaves surviving him his widow and five children, two children having previously departed this life. Those who survive him are Mrs. Hans Wulf, of near Ellis; Mrs. Fred Hachmann, of Arion, this county; Mrs. Charles Schultz, of Odebolt, Sac county; Mrs. H. C. Finner, of Waterloo, Iowa, and Otto, who is now a married man living in Denison, having been for several years one of the capable men employed on the Review.

Henry Vosgerau was an upright and honorable citizen who enjoyed the respect of all who knew him. He was an affectionate husband and an indulgent father. He enjoyed nothing better than looking after the welfare of his wife and children.

The funeral services were held on Tuesday at eleven a. m., the Rev. Richter officiating, after which the interment occurred at the Stockholm township cemetery. The Review extends to the bereaved widow and children its sympathy.

NOTICE TO THE VOTERS OF CRAWFORD COUNTY, IOWA.

You are hereby notified that the following question will be submitted to the voters of Crawford county, Iowa, to be voted on by them at the general election to be held on November 8, 1910:

"Shall the County of Crawford, of the State of Iowa, by and through its Board of Supervisors, be authorized to sell to the highest bidder for cash the Southwest Quarter of Section Thirty-one (31), Township Eighty-three (83), North of Range Thirty-nine (39), West of the 5th P. M., Crawford county, Iowa, said land being the property of the said Crawford county, and use the funds derived from the sale of said land for the purpose of constructing proper and suitable buildings on the East Half of the Northeast Quarter of Section Thirty-six (36), Township Eighty-three (83), North of Range (40), West of the 5th P. M., Crawford county, Iowa, land now owned by the said Crawford county, said buildings to be used as a County Home, said County Home buildings to cost a sum not to exceed \$25,000.00, and that the said Board of Supervisors be authorized to issue not to exceed Twenty-five negotiable bonds, for the payment of the construction of said buildings, in the denomination of \$1,000.00 each, payable ten (10) years after date thereof, and drawing interest not to exceed 5 percent per annum, payable annually, reserving the option to the said county to pay any or all of said bonds on any interest pay date at any time after Five (5) years from date thereof; also to levy an annual tax at the September meeting of the said Board of Supervisors in each year, beginning with the year 1911, on the taxable property of the said county, not to exceed two (2) mills on the dollar of the county valuation in any one year and continuing from year to year, in addition to the usual and ordinary taxes of said county, sufficient to pay the interest on said bonds and the bonds themselves when they become due, but the said Board of Supervisors to issue only such a number of the said 25 negotiable bonds as will be required to pay for the construction of the said County Home buildings after the funds, derived from the sale of the above described land, have been exhausted?"
