The poor farm proposition, which was up before the voters of Crawford county at Tuesday's election, carried by a majority of 970. This means that the voters of Crawford county have authorized the board of supervisors to build a home for the poor in the county, the cost of which is not to exceed \$25,000. The board of supervisors will sell the 160 acres now owned and use the proceeds to build the home on another piece of land owned by the county. Bonds will be issued to make up the deficiency between the price of the land sold and the cost of the new building.
