Tuberculosis News.

Des Moines, Nov. 15.—Many communities are asking the question if tuberculosis is a preventable disease, why not prevent it? Some cities and towns are planning for definite work this fall and winter and it is to be hoped that before the coming spring much will have been accomplished.

It is well known that any adequate attempt at suppression, however, must involve the building of retreats or sanatoria for the care and treatment of the tuberculosis patient. The consumptive must be cared for. This method is humane and civil, and while it does not compel the patient to go to the retreat or sanatorium, it provides the place for him, and experience has demonstrated that the patient is only too willing to accept the opportunity to receive treatment and recovery.

The great difficulty which confronts any community in its efforts to provide for the tuberculosis class, however, is lack of funds and how to secure sufficient money to finance such an undertaking. Various methods have been proposed and some of them are worthy, indeed, but the one which seems to be the most available is that of the National Red Cross Christmas Seals, which have proven their efficacy as a money-raising device in many of the cities of the country and also the towns. The National Red Cross society has generously arranged this year to give to all committees handling the Christmas seals, 87 1/2 per cent of the receipts, the society to receive 12 1/2 per cent, and to take back all unused seals.

What might be suggested is this, that communities undertaking this work shall select a committee of the most influential citizens who will carry out the plan presented by the Red Cross society, properly organizing the city or town and placing on sale in public places the seals. These seals are pasted upon Christmas parcels of all kinds, and thousands of dollars may be realized from them. Any committee desiring further information with reference to the Red Cross Christmas seals, as well as any so-

ciety or club, can receive the same by addressing the department on Tuberculosis, Board of Control, Des Moines, Iowa.

It may be added that this is an ideal method of securing funds for any charitable purpose whatsoever, but let me urge that the movement against tuberculosis have the first consideration.—A. E. Kepford, Lecturer.

CAUSE OF IOWA EXODUS

President of Des Moines Real Estate Exchange Says That the People Are Too Prosperous.

LURE OF CHEAP LANDS BLAMED

If Iowa Farmers Were Living From Hand to Mouth They Would Be More Contented.

Des Moines, Nov. 15.—Prosperity was the downfall of Iowa in population, according to Mack Olsen, president of the Des Moines Real Estate exchange.


Iowans with a per capita wealth of \$1,828, Mr. Olsen says, are not contented to remain in Iowa when the lure of cheap lands and speculation is calling them to western states and territories.

"My only solution of the fact that Iowa lost almost 7,500 in population is that the people of this state are too prosperous," he said. "They are not contented to stay here where they made their fortunes. If the Iowa farmer was poor and was living from hand to mouth he would be contented on his farm. Under those conditions Iowa would have shown an increase in population."

"Prosperity has increased the size of the farms in Iowa. The large farms have not increased the population but decreased it as it is possible, with modern machinery, to cultivate a large farm with the same number of hands as a small farm."

"When the Iowa farmer, with 160 acres, makes enough to invest in cheap western lands he sells his farm to the neighbor across the road and moves from the state. The neighbor cultivates both farms with the same help. So Iowa has lost an entire family."

For instance the father, who has

become independent, wishes to retire and he gives his farm to the boy. He moves to the city. The boy then makes sufficient money to invest in western lands and desires the speculative side of the business—the same as the early settlers of Iowa. Then he sells to his neighbor and goes west. Therefore Iowa loses another family.

That is the story of the exodus from Iowa. Iowa soil is too fertile and too productive to keep the people here. Iowans become independent within a few years and then they want to leave—want to speculate in new lands."

DES MOINES LETTER

Des Moines, Nov. 14.—Special—That Iowa, the state watched by the entire nation because of its factional strife, should maintain its republican equilibrium when such other states as New Jersey, New Jersey, Massachusetts, Indiana and Ohio were swept off their republican legs by the democratic landslide, is considered miraculous. With the entire state ticket elected, together with ten out of eleven congressmen and a gain in the legislature, those who have been in charge of the republican campaign feel well satisfied with the outcome.

According to Chairman C. F. Franke of the republican state central committee, the only thing that saved Iowa from being swept into the democratic column was an effective republican organization in every one of the counties. "Iowa acted as a political windbreak to the whirlwind which had gained such impetus in the east that it bid fair to sweep the entire nation," said Mr. Franke today. "The storm could be seen coming for months and some strong barricade had to be provided if the tide were to be stemmed."

With that idea in mind an organization was built up and when the storm hit that windbreak, so much dust was raised and things were so generally stirred up that the clearing of the political atmosphere had to be awaited before the final result could be determined. At no time, however, did Chairman Franke concede the election of Claude R. Porter as governor, but maintained that country precincts would more than offset the losses in the city. The logic of his claims was realized the day following election as more of the country precincts were heard from.

Those who view the outcome of the election with a superficial inspection fail to realize the enormity of the organization which brought about another republican victory in Iowa. The results obtained by Chairman Franke two years ago, by laying special stress on organization, strengthened his belief in that method of campaigning; and his foresight and judgment in perfecting an organization this year has been amply demonstrated by the effect it had under adverse campaign conditions.

At the party headquarters in Des Moines the names of more than 50,000 active republican workers are on file and they have been thoroughly coached on organization work. That everything depended on the polling of the country vote has been realized for months, and during the entire period that the chairman has been building up the organization he has sought to impress the importance of this fact upon the minds of his workers.

On November 3d, five days before election, he sent the following letter to all the chairmen, legislative candidates and all committeemen:

"Judging from reports received by this committee from every county in the state, the indications are that the

salvation of the republican party in Iowa this year depends upon the rural vote. The democrats are making the effort of their lives to stamper the city voters on various issues. There is an average of from 600 to 700 farmer republican voters in each county who will not vote at the polls next Tuesday, more on account of their prosperous condition or carelessness, than for any other reason, unless they are practically taken to the polls. You know what this means throughout the state.

"I urge upon you to exert your best possible efforts to get out the vote. If advisable call at once another meeting of your county candidates, legislative candidates, committeemen and influential republicans, and leave nothing undone that will insure a full party vote. Do not let anything discourage you, but insist upon complete co-operation and activity upon the part of all republican workers."

"Trusting that the final result will be gratifying, I am with kind regards, Yours truly,

"C. F. Franke, Chairman."

The uniformity of manner in which republican workers got out the vote in each precinct of the state is evidence of the effectiveness of the organization. Each precinct has an organization of its own, but instead of working independently it co-operated with the county organization. Each county organization was an integral part of the state organization, and in that way movements could be directed with certainty. On election morning republican workers went to phones located as nearly as possible to the voting precincts with poll lists in their hands, began calling up each voter to determine whether he intended to vote. If he did not manifest an interest, a vehicle was sent after him and he was transported to the polls.

Throughout the entire campaign the state committee has worked in harmony, regardless of the fact that six of its members represented one faction and five the other. Every argument made by Chairman Franke and every bit of literature sent out from the state headquarters urged the election of the entire republican ticket.

Speaking was confined to the last few weeks of the campaign. Because of the many elements that entered into the campaign, quiet work was the only kind that could be effectively done. 
