

## MR. CHAS. TABOR GIVEN BANQUET

Guest of Honor at Dinner Given by His Friends Saturday Evening at Hotel Denison.

### ONE HUNDRED GUESTS PRESENT

Elegant Supper Served and Speeches Made by Messrs. Lally, Conner and Tabor.

Charles Tabor was the guest of honor at a dinner given by a number of his Denison friends on Saturday night at the Hotel Denison. Covers were laid for one hundred and twenty guests, which included among them a large portion of the business men of the city. The dinner was given as an expression of the goodwill of the community toward Mr. Tabor on the eve of his departure for California to spend a portion of the winter, and later to be followed by a trip abroad, which will probably last several months.

Mr. Tabor left here on Tuesday for California, to be gone for an indefinite time, perhaps permanently, although his friends sincerely hope that after he has traveled for a time that he may be drawn to Denison again, and that his permanent residence may not be removed from here.

Lally arose, and in a few well-chosen remarks, spoke of Mr. Tabor's long residence in Denison; his prominence as a citizen; his success in business; his acts of charity and the things in his life which endeared him to the community, all of which was heartily approved by all those present. His remarks were supplemented by Mr. Conner, who expressed the wish that Mr. Tabor's relations with Denison should not be permanently severed, but that he might eventually be induced to return and make this his home. He assured Mr. Tabor that wherever the remainder of his days should be spent, the goodwill of the people of Denison would follow him. Mr. Tabor responded in a few remarks, showing clearly the burden which he carried in his effort to move away from Denison. He did not disguise the regrets that were in his mind in deciding to go away, but he thought the change of climate and surroundings would improve his health, and hence the decision to go. His heart was too full for utterance and everyone clearly saw and understood that, while he was pleased with the reception accorded him that his mind was burdened with the thought of having to bid farewell to his many friends and neighbors.

## LAST TERM FOR JUDGE CHURCH

With Ending of This Term of Court Judge Church Retires From the Judicial Bench.

### SUCCEEDED BY HUTCHINSON

Last Week of Present Term of Court a Busy One—A Number of Cases Being Disposed of.

The district court is on the last week of the term, and that means the last term of this year. After January 1st there will be a change in the personnel of the judges to the extent that Judge Church will retire and Judge Hutchinson will succeed him. Judge Church is finishing up a long and successful judicial career, having occupied the district bench with credit for several terms. Crawford county supported him and assisted in bringing about his nomination the first time he was nominated and has supported him every time since. He returned Monday from his home after adjourning over the middle of last week.

The jury was on hand and ready for work as soon as court convened. The first case, that of Edling versus Swanson, was called for trial immediately upon court convening on Monday. The Edlings were on hand ready for trial, but Swanson failed to materialize, and through his attorney asked for a continuance, based on his absence. The motion for a continuance was overruled and the case was then tried without the defendant, with the result that the plaintiff recovered a judgment for something in the neighborhood of \$2,000.

The next case called for trial was that of A. Alexander versus the C. M. & St. P. Railway company. This is a suit brought by the plaintiff against the defendant for damages which the plaintiff claims on account of his crops being overflowed by the Boyer river. The case is still on trial before a jury and will probably last until tomorrow night or Friday. There are quite a

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## THE FUNERAL OF MR. H. C. LAUB

Held at M. E. Church Friday and Was Very Largely Attended by Surrounding Friends.

### THE REV. THURRESON ASSISTS

Rev. Senseney and Other Pastors of the City in the Services—Floral Offering Very Beautiful.

On Friday afternoon the body of Henry C. Laub was conveyed from his late residence to the First Methodist Episcopal church of this city, where the funeral services were held at two o'clock. Rev. J. H. Senseney, pastor of the church, had charge of the services and was assisted by other pastors in the city, as well as by Rev. Thurreson of Perry, a former pastor and personal friend of Mr. Laub.

The day was an ideal one and there was a large attendance on the part of friends and neighbors of the deceased, there being quite a good many of the early pioneers in the audience. The business houses of the city, out of respect to the memory of Mr. Laub, closed during the time of the services. The services were simple, but impressive. The hymns were selected from those which were favorites of Mr. Laub, lines from many of which he frequently quoted during his prolonged illness.

The sermon of the pastor portrayed the life and work of this distinguished citizen and the influence which he wielded over the community. His remarks were of a tender and sympathetic character and recalled prominent incidents in the life of the deceased within the knowledge of the speaker.

Rev. Thurreson dwelt upon some of the notable characteristics of Mr. Laub and spoke of his pleasant personal relations with him during the few years he had known him. He spoke of his hopefulness and cheerful and happy disposition, and his willingness to encourage others when disappointments and sorrows came into their lives.

After the services at the church,

the body was taken to Oakland cemetery for burial. The pall bearers were John Kott, C. L. Voss, Eugene Gulick, J. P. Conner, W. R. Temple and C. Green. There was a profusion of flowers at both the home and the church, which were furnished by loving and sympathetic friends. The eulogies pronounced upon the deceased and the flowers contributed by loving hands and hearts, were all entirely appropriate, but the thought naturally suggested itself; why is it that flowers and eulogies are withheld until after our friends are called away?

We recognize the custom, which apparently is ineshorable, that these things shall come after death and not before, but we are inclined to believe that it would be better if the custom should be relaxed enough to recognize sacrifices made and devotion to duty exhibited while one is yet among the living. A splendid illustration is furnished in this case in the complete consecration and devotion of the wife during the long and serious illness of her husband and while his condition was such that he was practically unable to help himself. For many long months, and even years, this wife, prompted by the love which she bore her husband, with cheerfulness devoted her life to making him comfortable and happy. It may be said that it was her duty to do all that she did, and this may be conceded, and yet it is not always the case that duty is discharged as it was in this instance. Mrs. Laub, in her complete devotion to duty, is entitled to and should receive the esteem and affection of everyone in this community.
