Sunday School Column

Side Lights on Next Sunday's Lesson for Teachers and Pupils

Dec. 4—Peter's Denial.—Matt. 26, 31-35, 69-75.

We consider this week one of the remarkable incidents of the bible, the denial of a knowledge of Jesus by Peter, one of the chief of His disciples. If it were not written in the book there would be a strong denial that such a thing could happen. But a short time ago, when speaking of the betrayal of Judas, we called attention to the fact that he was warned that he would do the base act, yet persisted in doing it. Today we find Peter doing the very things Jesus told him he would do, after that disciple had specially vowed that he would not. So the wicked Judas and the afterwards saintly Peter both were headstrong when it came to heading the warnings of the Master.

The record tells us as found in all the gospels, that while Jesus was a prisoner on the night He was betrayed Peter joined the groupe of soldiers and curiosity seekers who were warming themselves about fires which had been started. On being accused of being one of the followers of Jesus, the prisoner, Peter denied that he was such three times and this with much violence. After the last denial the record in Luke 22-61 declares "The Lord turned and looked upon Peter." Then he remembered Jesus had told him that "before the cock crow twice, thou shalt deny me thrice." The look and the rush of memory caused Peter to come to himself and he left the company, going out to weep bitterly.

We gain some insight into the reason for the terrible test given Peter by recalling the words of Jesus as found in Luke 22, 31-32. Here it is told that Jesus declared as to Peter, "Satan hath desired to have you, that he may sift you as wheat; but I have prayed for thee, that thy faith fail not; and when thou art converted, strengthen thy brethren." It seemed necessary as a warning to us and to make Peter that valiant preacher for Jesus which he afterwards became, for him to pass through this ordeal which would have crushed a man of a weak nature. Peter had said that though all others forsook Jesus, he never would. Alas, in the words of the golden text written by the great apostle Paul, "Let him that thinketh he standeth take heed lest he fall."

Without doubt very many will say within themselves, "I would never deny Jesus in that way," and yet none are free from denials of Jesus either directly or by failure to defend His name and the bible religion He taught. It takes one of lion heart and the closest touch with God, not to deny discipleship of Jesus when personal comfort and desire to be thought well of at the time are on one side, and ridicule on the other. So, keeping in mind the words of Jesus as to the one without sin, casting the first stone, let none be rash in their denunciation of Peter.

While thinking of the subject of confessing Jesus let us call to mind His words, that any who confess Him in this world, will He confess before God in heaven. These words so very important are found in Matt. 10-32. There also is found the statement that those who fail to confess or deny Him, such will He deny before the Father. The best way is to live right in the open as a christian. By this one gains the respect of those who know him, and the temptations to deny and fall away are much less. There are thousands of instances on record where a prompt avowal of Jesus has been the means of helping others into christian lives and been further most strengthening to the one making the confession. Thus one blesses others and makes a gain to himself.

The lesson as to Peter is comforting in this that many of us find we are falling when tempted, and thus discouraged. May it not be that like

Peter we are being tried, with the hope that this will awaken us to our weakness, our self-satisfaction, our self-righteousness, and make us draw closer to Jesus, the source of all strength. If thus tried, we want to come out of the fire as refined gold, and not as Judas, a weak wreck, so dependent that life has no further use for us. It is the "overcomers" who have the special place and the white robes, and we all want to be in that company. So let us profit by the fall of Peter, understand our weakness, keep on praying ground, live lives right in God's sight, and win the reward spoken of by Saint Paul as in the reach of all who serve God.
