DEATH AT NORDHOLM HOME.

The Eleven-Year-Old Daughter of Mrs. Sophia Nordholm Taken December 22nd.

Much sympathy is felt for Mrs. Sophia Nordholm and her family, from whose home the eleven-year-old daughter and sister was taken on Thursday morning last. The death angel came for Hattie Matilda after an apparent illness of three weeks. She was not a strong child, but her immediate death was not thought of until the physicians pronounced her trouble as anemia in a vigorous form, giving no hope of recovery. To see the child fade from earth with no human hand to stay her departure wrung the heart of the mother and all others knowing of the scenes being enacted at the home on Wall street just west of the court house. Of course loving hands ministered to her wants until she passed away peacefully at 8:45, December 22nd.

The dear child was born on a farm north of Charter Oak, April 17 1899. Some five years ago her father died. She leaves her mother and sisters, Mable, Julia, Edith and Hazel, and brother, Lester. The funeral was held at the home on Saturday last, Rev. LaRau, of the Baptist church officiating. As three of the sisters are in different classes of the high school their classmates sent special floral tokens. Six little girl playmates of the departed one acted as pall bearers. The casket was taken to Charter Oak, accompanied by the sorrowing relatives. Only those who have had experience with anemia can fully appreciate the feelings of the mother. The hope of a reunion before many years is giving much comfort and also the expressed sympathy of her friends. The family make public the following card:

His field will be here in western Iowa so that he will make his headquarters here in Denison. He believes that Denison is as good a place as there is in Iowa for a home and with a fine new policy backed by this old reliable company he feels perfectly safe in relying on his friends and hard work to bring the desired results in his new work.

Mr. Hoffman expresses himself as very grateful to the people of Crawford county for the many favors of the past years, but he feels that he cannot longer afford to continue in the office at an ordinary salary with no promotion. He is looking to the future for that rainy day as many other school men are doing. Within the past month the city superintendents of the public schools at Carroll, Fort Dodge and Ida Grove have resigned their positions to go into other work. Last year three other school superintendents in this vicinity quit the school business—two for the farm and one for law. If this rate continues among our school men he will soon be superseded by the school man altogether.
