She is survived by five sons and two daughters, and a large number of relatives scattered throughout Iowa. In her death a kind, patient and loving mother, who had done her part in life, passed to the great beyond. Those who remember her during the time she was a resident of this county will join in the sorrow of the children at her departure, but firm in the belief that true christian life has ended on earth to enter upon a happier and better one. She was buried from St. Ann's church Tuesday, February 21st. The funeral was largely attended by sympathizing relatives and friends.
