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COUNTY HISTORY

IS NOW READY

It is the Most Important Local Work That Has Ever Been Presented to the People.

CONSISTS OF TWO VOLUMES

History as Written by F. W. Meyers Will Stand as Authority for Many Years to Come.

The much talked of and long expected history of Crawford county, edited by F. W. Meyers and published by the S. J. Clark Publishing company, of Chicago, is now ready for delivery and is rapidly being placed in the hands of subscribers. The history is in two handsomely bound volumes of approximately 500 pages each. They are well bound in half Morocco and well printed on excellent paper. There are many illustrations of familiar scenes and of familiar faces and these are printed on fine enameled paper with very artistic results.

The first volume is the one written by Mr. Meyers and those whom he called to his assistance. The frontispiece is a portrait of the author of the book. The first chapters are devoted to a brief outline of the earliest history of the territory of which Crawford county is a part. These chapters are among the most interesting in the book and contain much information which should be in the possession of everyone. Chapter five treats of "The Birth of Crawford County," and this is followed by a chapter on "The Pioneers" and chapters containing the reminiscences of Thos. Dobson, B. F. Wicks, Morris McHenry, A. C. Lawson and others. Chapter eleven is a long one devoted to "County Government." In this chapter the official history of the county, as taken from the records of the board of supervisors from the year 1855, is given in a readable way and not as a mere recital of official facts. A brief chapter is devoted to a strictly non-partisan review of the political history of the county and this is followed by an interesting summary of the election results of the county from 1869 to 1910.

A very valuable chapter, contributed by Hon. W. H. Fleming, of Des Moines, treats of the legislative, judicial and congressional history of the county. This chapter sets forth all the various political divisions to which Crawford county has belonged since its organization and gives a complete record of all representatives, senators, judges and congressmen who have represented this county.

The history then returns to "The Beginning of Denison." This chapter and succeeding ones are based upon interviews with early settlers, old diaries and records and newspaper files. Portraits of J. W. Denison, founder of this city, and of Hon. H. C. Laub, its foremost builder, are features of this section of the work. The history of Denison and much of the history of the county is followed with painstaking fidelity through the various decades down to the month of August, 1911, making it a very recent history.

Chapter twenty-three is devoted to brief histories of the "Organizations of Denison." This is given more as a matter of record than as a chapter of general reading, but it is authoritative and will long stand as a permanent history of the various institutions of the city. The chapter on "Churches" will be of great interest to the many church members of Denison and of the county. The history of the Baptist church is from the pen of Mrs. Chas. K. Meyers; Dr. W. T. Wright contributes an interesting history of the Episcopal church, the splendidly written article on "The Methodists of Crawford County," was written by Mr. E. W. Pierce, and it embraces the Methodist church of the entire county. The history of Presbyterianism comes from various sources, the chief of which being Rev. J. James DePree, of Denison, and Rev. Harvey Hostetter, who writes of the Vail church. Mr. Chas. K. Meyers adds an interesting account of the work of the Sunday school association. Two chapters of special interest are those on Catholicism by Rev. Father M. J. Farrelly and on the Church of Latter Day Saints by Bishop C. J. Hunt, of Deloit.

One of the most thorough and historically accurate chapters of the entire history is that devoted to schools. This was the work of the veteran school man, Mr. Z. T. Hawk, one of our early county superintendents and principal of the schools, both at Denison and at Vail. This chapter contains not only the general school history of the county, but excellent histories of the schools of the various towns and a list of their alumni.

The old soldiers are accorded an honored space in the history, and the most complete roster of the veterans of the county that has ever been published is also given. Doubtless there are some whose names are not included, but painstaking care was taken to make the record complete and accurate. The "Patriotic Orders" and "The

Soldiers of the Spanish-American War" are next given consideration.

Following these are chapters on "Banks and Banking," "The Press," "The Old Settlers' Association," "The Death Roll of the Pioneers," "A Chapter of Tragedies," dealing briefly with the murders committed in the county since 1900, "Accidental Deaths," giving brief account of the mishaps which have proven fatal to citizens of the county, and this is followed by a miscellaneous chapter, which contains much of interest. This chapter includes a splendid review of the geology of the county, written by Prof. James H. Lees, Assistant State Geologist. This article is finely illustrated by a geological section of the state and by pictures of fossil discovered at or near Denison. Under the head of miscellany will also be found an editorial on "The Ridge Road," reproduced on the request of a number of subscribers, an advance comparative statement of the census, furnished especially for this work by the United States census bureau and an article by Mr. M. O. Connor on the "Coming of the Irish."

The remainder of the work is devoted to the history of the various towns of the county, these histories being as complete as possible and giving many interesting facts concerning the early settlement and later development of every section of the county. The historical volume is richly illustrated. The old familiar faces of A. D. Molony and Judhe Bassett, J. Fred Meyers and a host of pioneers look from the pages, and there are characteristic scenes from all portions of the county. One interesting illustration is a map of the county as published in 1863.

The second volume is hardly of less interest than the first. The place of honor is accorded to our representative young citizen, Mr. C. L. Voss. This volume contains brief biographies of nearly five hundred prominent citizens of the county. These sketches are well written, but are devoid of "gush" which sometimes makes such voluminous. There are contained many facts about the lives of friends and neighbors which are well worth reading. Those who have seen the volumes are fully satisfied with their worth and are glad that such a history has been written. One enthusiastic subscriber states: "In fifty years these books will be worth \$100 per set. As the demand for such a work is entirely local it could not have been published save as a subscription edition, but we believe none who have subscribed will regret having helped to make this work possible and those who did not appreciate its value will regret that they took no part in it. The editor of the historical volume worked zealously for many months, not for the compensation, which was not large, but in the hope of giving to the county a readable and permanent history of value to the people, and in this ambition we believe he has succeeded, as perhaps no other man in the county could have done. This on account of his long residence, his experience in newspaper work and his proven affection for the county and its people.

We believe that no one who is capable of appreciating a good history will be dissatisfied with this work and that those whose biographies are included will be glad that they are there. The publishing firm of S. J. Clark is responsible, both financially and morally, and has lived faithfully up to all their promises in regard to the work. No one can read this work without a much better knowledge of the county in which he lives and a deeper affection for it and its splendid people.

Moved by Greene, seconded by Chrestensen, that Proposed Ordinance No. 233—An ordinance requiring all telegraph, telephone and electric light wires and poles supporting same to be removed from certain streets in the city of Denison, Iowa, and either placed underground or in the alleys—be introduced and read. Greene, yes; Eggers, yes; Chrestensen, yes; Haugh, yes. Proposed ordinance was so read.

Moved by Eggers, seconded by Greene, that Proposed Ordinance No. 233, be placed on first reading. Motion carried, Greene voting yes, Chrestensen yes, Eggers yes, Haugh yes, Ordinance read.
Moved by Greene, seconded by Chrestensen, that rules be suspended and Proposed Ordinance No. 233 be placed on its second reading. Motion

carried; Greene, yes; Eggers, yes; Chrestensen, yes; Haugh, yes.

Moved by Eggers, seconded by Chrestensen, that rules be suspended and Proposed Ordinance No. 233 be passed to its third reading. Motion carried; Greene, yes; Eggers, yes; Chrestensen, yes; Haugh, yes.

Moved by Greene, seconded by Eggers, that Proposed Ordinance No. 233 do now pass, numbered 233, and be published according to law. Motion carried; Greene, yes; Chrestensen, yes; Haugh, yes; Eggers, yes.

Moved by Greene, seconded by Chrestensen, that cement floor be placed in chemical engine room of city hall and drain therefrom attached to city sewer. That a ventilator be placed in hose drying room also. Motion carried, all members voting yes.

Motion made by Eggers, seconded by Greene, that a sidewalk resolution, calling for a sidewalk on east side of Sweet street between Vine and Walnut street, abutting Lot 9, be passed. Motion carried, all members voting yes.

Motion made by Haugh and seconded by Coon, that a sidewalk resolution, calling for sidewalk on south side of Tremont street between Locust street and Washington avenue, abutting part of Lot 8 and all of lot 7, be passed. Motion carried, all members voting yes.

Moved by Chrestensen, seconded by Greene, that city engineer prepare plans and specifications for proposed sewerage and report at later meeting. Motion carried, all members voting yes.

Moved by Coon, seconded by Greene, that an additional levy of one mill be levied for road dragging and clerk authorized to certify same to county auditor. Motion carried; Greene, yes; Eggers, yes; Chrestensen, yes; Haugh, yes; Coon, yes.

Motion made and carried that clerk purchase blank books for recording ordinances and warrants, all members voting yes.

Moved by Coon, seconded by Eggers, that sewer committee wait upon Illinois Central Railway company, the C. & N. W. Railway company and R. R. Lenfeldt and secure permission to construct sewer through their grounds. Motion carried, all members voting yes.

Moved by Haugh, seconded by Greene, that all proceedings of the city council be published in the Denison Review and the Denison Bulletin. Motion carried, all members voting yes.

K C Lady Baltimore Cake
One cup butter; 2 cups granulated sugar; 1 cup milk; 1 teaspoonful rose water; 3 1/2 cups flour; 3 level teaspoonfuls K C Baking Powder; whites of 6 eggs, beaten dry.

Frosting for Lady Baltimore Cake
Three cups granulated sugar; 1 cup boiling water; whites of 3 eggs; 1 cup chopped raisins; 1 cup chopped nut-meats; 5 figs cut in thin slices.

Stir the sugar and water until the sugar is dissolved, then let boil without stirring until the syrup from a spoon will spin a long thread; pour upon the whites of the eggs, beaten dry, beating constantly meanwhile. Continue the beating until the frosting is cold; add the fruit and spread upon the cake.
