THE PASSING OF J. W. BUFFINGTON

Heart Failure Cause of Death of Highly Respected Citizen on Saturday Morning, March 25th.

RECENTLY RETIRED FROM FARM

Death a Severe Shock to Relatives and Friends—Funeral Held Monday and Largely Attended. On Saturday morning at 3:30 o'clock, J. W. Buffington, a prominent farmer, departed this life at his home in Denison, his age, at the time of his death, being 61 years, 10 months and 10 days. Heart failure was the cause of his death. Mr. Buffington had but a short time before his death moved from his farm, two miles north of Denison, into the city, intending to retire from the farm and make his home here. He had scarcely settled in his new home when he was stricken and death instantly followed. While he had been in failing health for some time, his death still came as a surprise. Jeremiah Wilber Buffington was born June 13, 1850, in Herkimer county, New York, and when a small boy his parents moved to Clinton county, Iowa. At the age of twenty years the deceased came to Crawford county with his widowed mother. On June 15, 1875, he was married to Eliza J. Milligan, and to this union were born nine children, seven of whom live to mourn the loss of their father, Mrs. Eugene Schuler, of Beldonia, Neb.; Mrs. Wiese, Mrs. Lilleholm, Mrs. Brøgden, Earl, Guy and Lloyd, of Denison, the latter two living at home. It is almost forty years since Mr. Buffington first came to Crawford county, the last nineteen years being spent on his farm north of Denison. He was a good neighbor and a man of highest integrity, a kind and loving husband and father and will be greatly missed by all of his friends and neighbors. Funeral services were held from the home on Monday forenoon at 10:30, the Rev. J. H. Senseney officiating, after which the body was taken to Oakland cemetery for interment. The out of town brothers and sisters of the deceased present at the funeral were: B. H. Buffington, Manilla, Iowa; J. W. Buffington, of Pocahontas; E. Z. Buffington, of Fairbanks, Alaska; Mrs. George Morse and Mrs. Emma Onstot, of Sioux City, Iowa.
