

POLAND CHINA SALE A SUCCESS

A. D. Jones' Offering of Seventy Head Brings Out a Good Crowd of Buyers on Monday.

\$192.50 WAS HIGHEST PRICE PAID

Total Amount of Sale, \$3,520.50; An Average of \$52.53 for Sixty-Seven Head.

The A. D. Jones sale of big type Poland China bred sows, held at Dunlap on Monday afternoon, brought big prices and the 67 head sold brought a total of \$3,520.50, an average of \$52.53 per head.

A number of Crawford county farmers were in attendance at the sale and they purchased 19 head, the total price paid for them amounting to \$978.00.

Mr. Jones has been in the hog business for a number of years and is famous throughout the corn belt for the big type Poland China hogs.

The sale was held on the Jones farm just east of the town of Dunlap, where a large tent had been erected to accommodate the crowd.
