THIRTEENTONS OF MEAT IN DITCH

Meat Car on Milwaukee Leaves the Track Near Kenwood Last Friday Night.

BRAKE BLOCK CAUSES ACCIDENT

Thirty or Forty Men Work All Night Repairing Track and Moving Meat Into Another Car.

Kenwood, May 12—Special—Quite a railroad accident occurred last Friday night at about 10:30, when one of the meat cars of a freight train containing about thirteen tons of meat and lard, left the rails and plunged down the steep bank into the creek, around the curve near the first crossing north of Kenwood. The cause of the accident was nearly a half mile north of this place, where one of the brake blocks unfastened itself and dropped down on the rails, throwing the car off the track. For this distance it ran along on the ties, cutting some of them in two, until the curve was reached when it swerved to the inside into the creek. The section men of Kenwood, together with thirty other men were busy all night Friday and all day Saturday repairing the track and the meat was taken out and put in another car. One lucky thing was that no other car was taken off, but the air brakes setting as soon as the cars uncoupled probably prevented this. The car will be lifted out of its den as soon as the derrick arrives.

VICTIM OF HOLD-UP.

Russell Lyon Held up by Two Men in Washington Park Friday—Shows Fight and Assailant Skips.

While Russell did not have any great amount of money on his person at that particular time, he was loathe to part with it, and instead of handing the money over he dealt the man on his left an unexpected blow with his right fist, which toppled him over and Russell at once made tracks for safer quarters. The men, who were evidently hoboes, were not at all pleased with the reception which they received, and during Russell's exit made numerous threats upon his life. After reaching the corner of the park Russell stopped and watched the two would-be hold ups making their getaway towards the railroad track. It has not been an uncommon thing for Denison citizens to be held up in this park, and at this particular time of the year when tramps are so numerous, those passing through the park should be cautious. Russell was indeed fortunate in escaping from the thugs and no doubt one of them is nursing a bruised head.
