Board of Supervisors Will Meet to Hear Petitions on the County Road System.

SECTION LINE ROAD TO KIRON

Roads As Finally Mapped Out by the Board of Supervisors Thursday and Friday Last.

In another column of this issue will be found a road notice signed by M. J. Collins, county auditor, in which he calls attention of the public that there is a map of Crawford county on file in his office furnished by the state highway commission, upon which is marked the roads of the county to be designated as the county road system. The notice also calls attention that on the third day of June there will come on for a hearing before the board of supervisors the matter of selecting and designating said county roads, and all petitions asking for any change in the proposed county system must be filed with the county auditor before said hearing is concluded.

At a meeting of the board on last Thursday the road system was again gone over and the following roads were designated: First came the trans-continental route along the line of Northwestern railway; then the road on the west side of the Boyer running from Deloit to Denison; Denison to the six mile house, where one branch will run to Charter Oak and the other to Schleswig. From a mile north of Charter Oak the road will run to Ricketts, then two miles east of Ricketts, one mile north, one mile east, four miles north and east into Schleswig. The road leading from Charter Oak west will run along the Milwaukee railway.

A road leading from Kenwood to Bell, and from Bell one mile south and east into Arion and also two miles south to Dow City has been chosen. The other roads are Denison to Buck Grove, Denison to Manilla; from Manilla one mile north and seven miles east to the Carroll county line, pass-

ing one-half mile south of Aspinwall. Running from Manilla the road goes one and one-half miles to the county line. From West Side four miles south and one mile east; Vail, two miles north, one-half mile east, six miles north and one mile east into Boyer.

On Friday the board went in a body and viewed the two roads leading from Deloit to Kiron, one known as the section line road and the other as the Newcom hill road. The citizens of Kiron had petitioned the board for the section line road, while other citizens equally interested had asked for the Newcom hill road. After going over both roads the board finally decided upon the section line road, running between Stockholm and Otter Creek townships.

No doubt there will be a number of petitions presented at the hearing on June 3d, and the board will have its hands full in making the final selections.

H. M. Cormany, state bank examiner, spent two days in Denison this week, during which time he made a complete and thorough examination of the condition of the Crawford County State bank. As the law requires this examination to be made it is a source of satisfaction to the bank and the community as well to know that the bank is in satisfactory condition. It has been the policy to require both national banks and state banks to submit to these examinations and have the report of their condition published. The public is made familiar with the method of banking and is able to judge whether a bank is engaged in private speculation or confined to the legitimate banking business. We do not believe that any reputable bank can complain at these examinations because the people who deposit their money in the bank are entitled to know its true condition and to know whether it is worthy of patronage.

SHAW'S BID AGAIN ACCEPTED

For the Second Time the Ex-Sec. of Treasury Has Chance to Get A. N. & S. Railroad.

PAYS IN FIFTEEN THOUSAND

Bid for the Road is Accompanied by Certified Check—Hearing of Harlan Charges Set This Week

Atlantic, May 19—Former Governor Leslie M. Shaw has another chance to realize his dream of owning the Atlantic, Northern & Southern railway.

His bid of \$294,000 for the road, as filed last Thursday, was formally accepted by Judge Thomas Arthur, who held court here this afternoon for the purpose of reviewing the bids. The bid did not appear in Shaw's name, but the Blakedell company, who made the offer, is commonly understood to be acting in his interests.

Shaw's bid was accompanied by a certified check for \$14,700, equivalent to 5 per cent of the total sum. This was taken by the court to apply on the purchase price, and further increases the amount of money which has been spent by him in his effort to obtain possession of the line.

The Shaw bid was the only one offered for the entire railroad. Robert Ablets offered \$120,000 for the south end, but no bid for the other part of the line was made.

This is the second time that Shaw has had an opportunity to secure possession of the A. N. & S. When the road was first sold Shaw was the successful bidder at \$402,000. He never completed the purchase, but he held an option on the line for considerably more than a year by making occasional payments on the purchase price. This money was lost to him when the court forfeited the sale some months ago.

The hearing of the charges against Receiver Harlan will start tomorrow morning. The receiver's books will be brought into the court room and examined in the presence of the court.
