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DR. SENSENEY IN MASTERLY SERMON

Memorial Day Sermon Best One Ever Delivered in Denison, Is Opinion of Everyone Hearing It.

CREATES PROFOUND IMPRESSION

Speaker Had Mastered Questions Which Divided South and North and Brought War.

Memorial services were held in the Baptist church on Sunday morning, several of the churches uniting in the service. While the weather was unfavorable, yet a good representation of the members of the Grand Army was on hand. The Relief Corps was well represented, as was also the Sons of Veterans. The church was comfortably filled with members of the churches and citizens generally.

The music for the occasion was furnished by the Baptist choir and it is unnecessary to say the singing was all that could be expected.

The sermon was delivered by Dr. Senseney, of the First Methodist church of this city. While a great many memorial sermons have been delivered in Denison, there never was a better one delivered in the city on an occasion of this kind. The speaker seemed to have mastered the questions which divided the people of the north and south and brought on the civil war, through which the country passed from 1860 to 1865. Not a single cause which contributed to bring on the conflict between the north and the south was omitted and not a single cause assigned but what did contribute, either directly or indirectly toward the unhappy rebellion. The differences socially between the north and the south; the condition of slavery, which existed in the south while in the north labor was free; a desire on the part of the statesmen of the south regardless of all costs, to make slavery universal which was as earnestly opposed by the north; the fault of the constitution of the United States which recognized slavery when it was adopted; the Dred Scott decision of the supreme court; the cher-

ished doctrine in the south of state rights, that is that the states were sovereign and supreme, and that the constitution was but a compact between the states which could be dissolved at will rather than a bond of union between the people of the several states in the union. All of these grounds and others were mentioned as causes which led up to the unfortunate civil war and were mentioned in a way to hold the undivided attention of the audience. The hardships and privations endured by the union soldiers; the sacrifice made by wives, mothers and daughters; the loss of life in southern prisons, hospitals and on the battlefields, were all portrayed as a part of the cost to the country to preserve the union. The speaker described the great benefits which came to the country through the heroic services and sacrifices of the men, some of whom were before him, others scattered throughout the broad land, but constantly decreasing in numbers by death, but the great majority sleeping in graves on southern battlefields, in national cemeteries and private burying grounds in all parts of the union.

The emancipation of the negro was described as an incident of the war, but was not the sole cause of it. The emancipation proclamation of Abraham Lincoln was issued as a war measure, but is now counted as one of the great acts of history. By freeing the negroes the United States fell into line with all the other great nations in stamping out the accursed institution of slavery never again to disgrace this fair land. The development and improvement of the negro race since the war was traced by the speaker and no doubt the rapid development of the race in the few years since held in bondage was a surprise to many who were present. In the comparison with other races the negro does not appear to suffer. In fact the progress of the colored people during the fifty years since they gained their freedom seems to have been little short of phenomenal.

The great results of the war are found in a union which cements and holds in its folds not only the men who wore the blue, but those who

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SUDDEN DEATH OF T. C. MCCARTHY

Community Startled at Announcement of Death of One of Denison's Well Known Citizens.

HEART FAILURE CAUSES DEATH

Funeral Held This Forenoon Was One of the Largest Held in Denison in Many Months.

The community was startled on Monday forenoon at the announcement of the death of T. C. McCarthy, which occurred about 11 o'clock in the forenoon at his beautiful home in North Denison. While many of his friends more familiar with the progress of his ailment were impressed with the seriousness of his illness and even prepared to hear of its fatal termination, people generally expected him to recover and to be engaged in his business in a short time.

Thomas Charles McCarthy was born on the 15th of August, 1860, making his age at the time of his death about 53 years, at Davenport, Iowa, and came with his parents to Crawford county about thirty-five years ago, where he has since resided, most of the time here in Denison. His father departed this life on his birthday about ten years ago, but his mother still survives him. He was married in 1887 to Miss Elizabeth Fitzpatrick, who was raised in this locality, and survives him. The deceased has two brothers living, Patrick McCarthy, of Springfield, S. D., and John, of this city; also two sisters, Anna and Ella, both living in Denison.

About five weeks ago Mr. McCarthy visited Excelsior Springs, Mo., thinking that the waters of that place would benefit him, but he failed to secure the results that he had hoped for. His lungs became involved and later his heart and it is supposed that the latter was the cause of his death.

Mr. McCarthy was one of the enterprising citizens of Denison and was a person willing to invest his money in Denison, his home city in which he

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EXPERT DRAFTS LIGHT FRANCHISE

City Secures Electrical Expert Who Submits Franchise Acceptable to Members of Council.

COMPANY MUST EXPEND \$30,000

Franchise As Prepared Protects the City in Every Way, in Case It Is Adopted.

Since the defeat of the electric light franchise a year ago considerable effort has been made to prepare a franchise that would be free from objections on the part of both the city and the electric light company.

One of the purposes has been on the part of the company to offer a franchise less voluminous than the old one, which was voted down before, and which developed opposition on account of its length, and with that thought in mind several months ago the company prepared a franchise and submitted it to the council, which did not embrace more than a third of what the old one embraced and which the company thought avoided the objectionable features in the one now in force. At the various meetings held to consider the franchise presented by the company no serious objections were manifested by the city, but it was thought better to let the matter drift along and consider it without haste, and while the company on two or three occasions had invited an expert to be present, the city felt that it would be the part of wisdom to also select an expert to consider the proposition, and with this thought in mind a couple of weeks ago an expert connected with one of the large electrical houses of Kansas City came here on invitation of the members of the council and after consulting with them an agreement was entered into by which he was to take with him to Kansas City the franchise which the company had prepared and which had been under consideration for some time, and after considering it, he was to prepare a franchise such as in his judg-

ment the city should require to be submitted.

One day last week this expert returned with the franchise prepared in his office, which was intended as a substitute for the one which the company had prepared, and was so much unlike it that one would scarcely believe that the two franchises were intended for the same plant. After the expert and the members of the council had considered the new franchise for several hours the members of the company were told that they could have a chance to look it over and make such objections as they desired. A meeting was held at which the new franchise was discussed, but few changes were permitted to be made in it as the expert was firm in his conviction that his franchise was up-to-date, and as nearly perfect as a franchise could be drawn, that it was his business to draw franchises for just such cases and that his experience was a guarantee of the perfection of his franchise.

The franchise which is offered reduces the income of the company on commercial and residence lighting in excess of a thousand dollars annually over what the income now is. The requirements made in the new franchise of the city demands improvements which are certainly beyond what any person expected would be demanded of the company. The demand is that the company shall expend \$20,000 the first year and \$10,000 the next year, making \$30,000 in all in remodeling the plant and this regardless of whether that much will be needed or not, and to insure this amount being expended the company is required to have plans and specifications prepared within ninety days after the passage of the ordinance for approval of the council and if approved, then the company is expected to make the improvements strictly according to the plans and specifications and to insure this being done the company is required to put up a bond of \$25,000 with sureties to be approved by the city council.

The franchise as prepared is double the length or more than the one which the company had prepared, but the expert insists that he has covered on-
