### DISPLAY DRAWS ATTENTION

The Balle-Brodersen Company Window Contains Unique Exhibit—The Capitol in Soap.

A most unique and attractive display occupies one of the big windows of the store of the Balle-Brodersen company today.

The exhibit, which will remain in the window a few days, is a "soap symphony"—a facsimile of the new United States Capitol building now in course of construction at Washington and which will be completed in 1914. The view of the building shown is the front elevation with the mammoth arch of triumph and ornamental columns of liberty and the chariot of progress.

Two thousand cakes of Royal Cuticle soap are used in the building's construction. The vast hall and colonnade, flanked with smaller halls running through the center of the building and reaching in height to the dome, which is crowned by an American eagle with outstretched pinions, is copied with exactness.

Even the architectural adornment of the structure, the intricacies of visionary rooms of the interior, including the handsome reading rooms, offices and various bureaus are all well preserved. Handsome flags of the country wave from every cornice. Grassy lawns and graveled walks are seen, and the whole structure is a triumph in soap architecture, all created from the humblest but most necessary of materials—soap.

### Denison Still Eats Dust.

And still the dust is with us. After the business streets of the city received a thorough coat of oil dust rolls up the streets in great clouds and one could hardly tell that oil had been applied. Several of the merchants have changed their opinion about oiled streets and are now ready to resort to the old method of settling the dust by the use of the sprinkler. Today dust is in evidence everywhere and a number of the business men are endeavoring to get the sprinkler in use before evening. One merchant informs us that the dust that is now blowing into his store is much worse than that which was in evidence before the oiling. The dust sticks to everything and when an article is dusted it leaves a dirty oil mark, while before things could be dusted without much damage. It has cost the merchants, together with the money expended by the city in getting the streets in readiness, in the neighborhood of a thousand dollars to oil the business section of the city and now conditions are as bad, if not worse, than before the oil was applied.
