On Oct. 10, 1887, he was united in marriage to Miss Lizzie Langan, who, with two sons and two daughters, survive. Mr. Hill had the respect of all who knew him and was a loving husband and father, devoted to home life, a kind neighbor and a good citizen. A host of friends unite in extending sincere sympathy to those bereaved. The funeral was held Monday from St. Ann's church at 10 o'clock with interment in St. Ann's cemetery. 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
