







OVER THE STATE.

Shelby Votes for Light.
Shelby, Dec. 8—The question of granting a franchise for twenty years to the Avoca Electric Light and Power company (incorporated) was voted on here Monday, 135 voting for it and 5 against. It is estimated that the lights will be turned on about February 1st.

Rockwell City Is Dark.
Rockwell City—Early morning break fasts were prepared in darkness by those who could not find an old candle or two around the house, due to the wrecking of the local electric light plant by fire.

The blaze was discovered about 1 a. m. by the fireman at the plant. Soot on top of one of the boilers had caught fire. He had only time to give the alarm and make his escape so rapidly did the flames spread.

While the building is almost a total wreck the manager believes a temporary plant can be rigged so that the lights can be furnished in a day or two. No estimate as to the loss has been given out.

Has Five Miles of Paving.
Shenandoah, Dec. 8—The paving company has completed the work of paving sections of Thomas, West, Clarinda, Ninth avenue and the alley between Elm and Church streets back of the Methodist church and have prepared the asphalt plant and other paving machinery for removal from Shenandoah.

The first paving was done in Shenandoah in 1905 and was the brick pavement down town. Since then, wood block, cement and asphaltic-cement pavement has been laid here and the last named seems to have proven to be the most satisfactory. The asphaltic-cement is a two inch covering of asphaltum on a four inch base.

The amount of paving completed to date and not including the contract just finished is, brick, 2.81 miles; wood blocks, .8 miles; cement, .5 miles and asphaltic, 1.37, total of 5.03 miles.

The city of Shenandoah has other public improvements such as 12.77 miles of water mains; 13.47 miles of sewer mains and a park acreage of 34.5 acres for the use of its citizens.

The Coon Rapids Enterprise announces the proposed installation of a model K linotype, a two magazine machine, which certainly ought to afford ample composition facilities for that excellent newspaper. The Enterprise, true to its name, was among the first of the country newspapers to install machine composition and it has clung for a long time to the type setting machine. With its new equipment the Enterprise will have a new dress every week and will present a metropolitan appearance. The town of Coon Rapids is fortunate in having a newspaper man of the type of S. D. Henry, who insists that the very best is none too good for his constituency.

When Indian Strategy Failed.
The Indians depended to a great extent upon their cunning and strategy in their warfare against the whites, and many massacres resulted from the fact that the whites failed to see through the wiles of their red foes. But when the Sac and Fox Indians, with Black Hawk as one of their leaders, planned to massacre the garrison of old Fort Madison in 1809 they were disappointed. An account of this episode is printed in the October number of "The Iowa Journal of History and Politics," published by The State Historical society of Iowa. The Indians came to the trading-house to trade, as was their usual custom, and afterwards they asked permission to enter the stockade of the fort and give a dance for the entertainment of the garrison. The commanding officer was wise enough to refuse this request. Soon afterwards the Indians attempted to force their way into the stockade, but to their surprise they found themselves face to face with a sixpounder and with a garrison prepared for an attack. Realizing that their plans were discovered the Indians hastily withdrew and the fort was left unmolested.

First Quaker in Iowa.
"Hardly had the wigwags of the Indians disappeared from the Black Hawk Purchase on the west bank of the Mississippi River before the first Quaker appeared," says Mr. Louis T. Jones in a volume on "The Quakers of Iowa" which will soon be published by The State Historical Society of Iowa. According to Mr. Jones, a Quaker named Isaac Pigeon set out from South Carolina with his family in the summer of 1835, bound for the home of his wife and children with his sister at Rushville. "Isaac Pigeon crossed the Mississippi, pushed his way about thirty miles into the back country of the new purchase, and there put up sufficient prairie hay for the cattle which he intended to bring from the Illinois side. This done he returned to Rushville, and late in the same fall recrossed the Mississippi to Iowa with his family and all his possessions. Proceeding inland to the place where he had put up his winter's supply of hay, he located a claim about a mile and a half south of the present town of Salem in Henry County."
