PRIMARY VOTE IS VERY LIGHT

Spirited Contest Between Connolly
and Meredith, Democratic Candidates
for U. S. Senator.

CRAWFORD GOES FOR SAVAGE

Caswell, Candidate for State Senator,
Ghort of the Party Vote—
Evers Gets 1496

The vote at the primary in this county on Monday was particularly light in view of the interest which existed prior to the vote being taken. The most spirited contest in Crawford was between Meredith and Connolly, candidates for the United States senate on the democratic ticket, and for the office of sheriff with Cummings, Eggers and McGrath fighting for the nomination.

There was considerable interest in the candidacy of Governor Clarke and a large vote in his favor compared with that cast for his opponent shows his popularity among the voters of Crawford county. Governor Clarke was nominated by at least 45,000 majority. The governor has won the greatest victory any candidate for office has secured in this state for many years, and his plurality is a complete answer to those who sought by misrepresentation to defeat him.

Cummings wins in the contest for United States senator over Savage, but Savage held Crawford county against him.

Morris Connolly wins the nomination for United States senator on the democratic ticket by defeating Meredith. This contest was strenuous toward the last and enough hard things were said one against the other to insure a breach in the democratic party which can scarcely be healed before the election in November.

There was a hard fight on in the county between Cummings, Eggers and McGrath for sheriff, but Cummings had the county machine backing him and won in a walk, receiving 1029 votes as against Eggers 366 and McGrath 175.

There was somewhat of a contest for the office of county clerk on the democratic ticket, Monaghan and Vosgerau both being candidates. Monaghan polled 816 votes against Vosgerau 659, being nominated by a majority of 157.

SCHAFFER FAMILY ESCAPED DROWNING

Automobile in Which Conrad Schaffer and Family Were Riding
Goes Over Embankment.

ACCIDENT HAPPENED NEAR VAIL

Family Pinned Under Car in Three Feet of Water—Timely Assistance Saves Their Lives

An accident, which nearly resulted in the death of several people, occurred on the road just east of Vail Sunday afternoon when the machine Conrad Schaffer and family were riding in swerved off the high embankment and landed in the ditch thirty feet away from the main traveled road and pinned most of the occupants under the car. The accident occurred just after the heavy rain Sunday afternoon and the ditch south of the road was full of water and some of the occupants barely escaped drowning.

Conrad Schaffer, together with his wife and four children, left their home between Denison and Manilla early in the afternoon and were enjoying a ride in their new touring car. While the car has not been in their possession for many weeks, Mr. Schaffer was considered a good driver and has experienced no trouble up until Sunday. They drove to Vail and it was there they were caught in the rain. After waiting until the downpour ceased they started west toward Denison, and when about a mile out of Vail Mr. Schaffer attempted to turn out for another vehicle on the high embankment. Only recently this road has been worked and the road was graded up considerably to keep it from being washed by the floods, which are so common near Vail. It is thought that the bank gave away, causing the car to topple over into the ditch and land with the wheels up and all of the family to be pinned beneath, but Mr. Schaffer, Mr. Moore, a resident of Vail, happened along at the time of the accident and helped Mr. Schaffer to extricate his wife and four children from under the machine. The water was over three feet deep around the car at the time and had it not been for the timely arrival of Mr. Moore, doubtless some members of the family would have been drowned.

Mrs. Schaffer was quite badly injured and sustained a number of bad bruises, and for a time it was thought she would not recover, but we are pleased to report that her condition is greatly improved today.
