# DEATH RESULTS FROM OVERHEAT

Charles Gross, Employee of Chicago & Northwestern Steel Gang, Dies Suddenly Thursday.

**TRYING TO LOCATE RELATIVES**  
Body Taken to Salomon Undertaking Rooms and Held Pending Word From His Relatives.

Charles Gross was overcome by the heat Thursday afternoon while working with the steel gang on the Northwestern railway just west of Denison, and died at the passenger station shortly after 6 o'clock, before medical aid arrived.

The body was taken to the Salomon undertaking parlors, where it was prepared for burial, but interment will not be made until word is received from relatives or friends.  
Very little is known of Gross as he came to Denison from Chicago only three days prior to his death and began work with the steel gang on the Northwestern. He is about 45 years of age, and during the short time he worked with the gang, told very little in regard to his former whereabouts. He came without any baggage, but a newspaper was found on his person, giving the address of August Geringer, publisher of a Chicago Polish newspaper. Mr. John Schauer advised the editor of that paper of the death of Gross, but as yet has not received a reply, and unless he receives word within the next day or two, the body will be buried in Oakland cemetery at the expense of the Northwestern Railroad company. It had been hoped that relatives of the deceased might be located through the editor in Chicago.
