Iowa Has Distinctive Markers



Most of the localities along the Lincoln highway have been satisfied to mark the route by stenciling the Lincoln way copyright marker on telegraph or telephone poles in three colors; not so Linn county, Iowa.

This county has had made, sheet steel signs of standard size, enamelled in red, white and blue on both sides and mounted on steel posts which can be driven firmly into the ground. J. D. Blue, Jr., the Lincoln highway consul at Cedar Rapids, Iowa, who is responsible for this plan, is shown wielding a sledge on the Lincoln highway in Linn county, where he has struck many a good blow for better roads. These handsome and permanent markers have been put up, about eight to the mile, all across Linn county and even over into Cedar county to the west.
