A Proclamation

By the Governor.

The annual loss sustained by the people on account of fires is enormous. These losses are in fact an absolute waste because so many of them are preventable. Wisdom does not lie in speculating after the loss has been sustained upon how it could have been avoided, but in using all possible means of prevention before the disaster occurs. The fire loss in the state can without question be very greatly reduced if the people will use the care and diligence which the importance of the subject demands. Of ten great losses are sustained by many because of the negligence and sometimes even recklessness of others. In order that the attention of the people may, if possible, be concentrated upon the great necessity of preventing the great losses of property and life by fires, I do hereby proclaim that

be known as Fire Prevention day, and I earnestly recommend that it be observed by public meetings for the discussion of hazards to life and property by fire, for emphasizing individual responsibility for fires, for considering the questions of water supply and fire department, and for a general appeal to the people to examine the condition of their premises and to use the greatest care possible to prevent fires. In Testimony Whereof, I have hereunto set my hand and caused to be affixed an impression of the Great Seal of the State of Iowa, this 15th day of September, 1914. Attest, W. S.
