BATTLE BECOMES MORE VIOLENT

Struggle North of the Oise Goes on With Little Change on Either Side—Center Is Inactive

ALLIES GAIN GROUND IN NORTH
Cavalry Force at Lille—Large Masses of German Horsemen Hardly 10 Miles From Belgian Border

THE DAY'S WAR NEWS.
That the battle between the allies and the Germans to the north of the river Oise is growing more and more violent is the only statement that has been permitted to winnow through the sieve of official secrecy concerning the conditions prevailing on that part of the long battle line in France.
The military governor of Antwerp has reported to the burgomaster of Antwerp that a bombardment of the city is imminent. Both Germany and Russia continue to report successes in Galicia.
The French as an offset to previous similar action on the part of the Austrians have placed mines in the Adriatic in a zone which comprises "all Austrian water and the channels between the islands and the coast of Dalmatia."
A Berlin dispatch says: "The increased Turkish navy, it is expected, soon will be sailing in the Black Sea." No explanation of the statement was vouchsafed.
A news agency dispatch from Bordeaux announces that a number of important changes have been made in the German army commands.
An epidemic of dysentery has broken out among the Austrian troops in Bohemia and Moravia.
Great Britain has prohibited the exportation of raw wool.
Winston Spencer Churchill, first lord of the British admiralty, is said to be at Antwerp consulting with the Belgian chief-of-staff.
The Washington government is still without official advice concerning the landing of Japanese bluejackets on the island of Jaluit, in the Marshall Archipelago in the Pacific ocean.
London, Oct. 7, 1:34 a. m.—A Reuters dispatch from Paris gives the

French official communication issued last night at 11 o'clock as follows: "The characteristics of the situation remain the same. On our left wing to the north of the Oise the action is more and more violent."
In the center comparative calm prevails.
"A little ground has been gained in the northern part of the heights of the Meuse."

London, Oct. 6—The sixty-third day of the great European war saw a repetition of what the people of all countries concerned have forced themselves to expect, perhaps for months to come—no decisive conflict on land or sea.
From Berlin to London came nothing in the way of claims to progress or reverses. From Petrograd came what has flowed without interruption for weeks—persistent claims of progress for Russian arms.
Cavalry Near Lille.
Above all stood out the presence of what was described as large masses of German cavalry near Lille, hardly ten miles from the Belgian frontier, as the crow flies, and behind them German forces moving on a line between Tournai and Arras, the latter point right at the Belgian border.
At the same time the official communication makes it plain that the allies have not been idle and have been extending their line on the left wing more and more widely. Blow for blow evidently is being dealt around Arras, the scene of sanguinary fighting recently.
The same may be said of the region between the Somme and the Oise, for it is noticeable that the allies have claimed nothing there today except a see-saw advance and retirement. They do maintain that they have repulsed the enemy near Lassigny, upon which the Germans made a violent attack.
Advance at Soissons.
At Soissons, where the allies recently cleared the German trenches, according to the announcement, they have pressed their advantage by making a slight advance. Noyon forms the elbow from which the allied line sweeps eastward. Some advance by the allies is also reported at Berry-au-Bac.
From Belgium comes nothing to indicate any change in the situation before Antwerp except a brief line tucked at the bottom of the Paris official statement asserting that the German attacks along the line of the

BIRD MEN THIS WEEK

First Aeroplane Exhibition Ever Given in Crawford County Will Take Place Friday and Saturday.

TWO BIG DAYS OF REAL SPORT
Athletic Association Provides for Two Days of Entertainment in Denison Friday and Saturday.

The first aeroplane exhibition ever given in this county will take place on Friday and Saturday afternoons of this week at the athletic grounds on the college campus here in Denison, and Crawford county people will have the opportunity of seeing a real bird-man circle among the clouds over our city. An attraction of this kind has been talked of before on different occasions, but as the aviators giving exhibition flights demanded such a great amount of money it was considered out of the question to stage such an entertainment. Through the efforts of the directors of the Athletic Field association this obstacle has been overcome and at a great expense a real flying machine and aviator will be here Friday and Saturday and give four flights. Few people in Crawford county have ever witnessed an aeroplane flight for it is not a common thing to have an exhibition of this nature in a town as small as Denison. We have all read of these flights in Chicago, Omaha and other large cities where thousands of dollars are spent to secure the services of the bird men, but we are to be given the opportunity of witnessing such a flight right here in Denison at a nominal admission fee.
Flight From College Campus.
Directors of the athletic association who are anxious to raise money in order to complete the new athletic park on the college campus brought the matter before the Commercial club last Friday evening and secured the club's co-operation to the extent that members of the club signed the necessary guarantee to bring the aviator to Denison and this was a good stiff price, too.
The necessary contract was signed up with the famous Savage Brothers, of Sioux City, who agree to come to Denison for four flights, two on Friday afternoon and two on Saturday afternoon. The contract says that no flight no pay, so if the machine fails to make a flight all admissions to the

ground will be refunded. Savage Brothers are well known aviators and are known throughout the west for their daring acts while soaring around thousands of feet from the earth. It will be a wonderful sight to see this heavier than air machine flying over the city, cutting all kinds of figures, and then, too, we have been promised a demonstration of bomb dropping such as we have read about in the European war, only the bombs will be paper bags of flour. Flights are promised rain or shine, so that nothing but a perfect rule can interfere with this great exhibition. The college campus, which comprises 20 odd acres, will make an ideal place for the flight, as it will be easy for the aviator to make his ascent and landing on the gently sloping land.

The flying machine will be on exhibition both Friday and Saturday afternoons in front of the grand stand at the ball park, where people will have the liberty of inspecting it.
Arrangements All Completed.
Arrangements for the two big days are now completed and everything will be carried out as advertised. From Seagrave avenue the entire college campus will be enclosed for these days and the road through the campus will be closed to traffic. Admission for adults will be 50 cents and for school children 25 cents. On account of the large crowd which will be in attendance it has been decided to have tags with strings attached for fastening on each person for admission tickets and every person will be required to wear these in plain sight. These admission tags will be placed on sale at the drug stores and other business houses on Friday and Saturday so that people may not have to wait at the grounds. Arrangements have been made for parking automobiles on Seagrave avenue and on the highways through the college campus, where a good view of the grounds may be had.

Push Ball Contest.
Those who have charge of the two days plan to give plenty of entertainment for the visitors. A push ball contest will be staged at the ball park on Friday afternoon immediately after the first aeroplane flight, though the efforts of Albert Weiss it was possible to secure the new push ball from the State Agricultural college. The ball cost the college \$250. A number of teams are now being organized and they will battle with each other to see which side can push this huge ball 7 feet in diameter, across a given line. Push ball is a great sport.

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PACKAGE RESEMBLING KEG

Interesting Lawsuit From Manila Is Tried Before Justice Rollins on Monday of This Week.

CASE WAS SOMEWHAT NOVEL
Cennis McCord Charged with Illegally Transporting Liquors to Person Not Holding Permit

A law suit of more than ordinary interest was tried before Justice Rollins on Monday of this week. The case was that of the State of Iowa vs. Dennis McMahon, being a state case brought against him by the county attorney assisted by Mr. Sims, charged with illegally transporting liquors to a person not holding a permit to sell liquors.
The evidence discloses that a package resembling in outline a beer keg, covered up and contained in a gunny sack, was spotted in an automobile at Manning by a Mr. Farrell and brought to Manila to the home of one Mr. Schroeder where a wedding was celebrated on the evening of the day that the package was brought and, no doubt, the contents of the package consumed.
Mr. McMahon is charged with having brought the package from Manning to the Schroeder home in Manila. It is said the carrying of the package of intoxicating liquor, if such it was, was a mere incident in the transaction, the ostensible purpose of the trip was carrying passengers and not intoxicating liquor. A charge made was only for carrying passengers and no charge whatever, it seems, was made for carrying the package.
There was no evidence that the liquor was taken to the Schroeder home for the purpose of selling, at least, this fact was not within the mind of the person who carried the package at the time of the transaction. In fact, it is not known that Mr. McMahon knew what the package contained. The evidence in the case was not in dispute and it became a question of law for the court to decide.
The court held, under the evidence, that no violation of law had been shown and the prisoner was discharged.
Morris O'Connor appeared for the defendant, McMahon, and won the decision of the court, notwithstanding the doubling of forces against him.
The questions presented in the case

were somewhat novel as the same questions had not been before a court in this county.

200 ATTEND FROM DENISON

German Day Celebration at Schleswig Draws Splendid Crowd From Here, Notwithstanding the Rain.

GOOD ENTERTAINMENT GIVEN
Big Parade and Stirring Addresses—Wrestling Match Proves Exciting—Three Bands There.

Over two hundred people from Denison attended the German day celebration at Schleswig yesterday, taking advantage of the special train over the Northwestern, which left here about 9:30. Had it not been for the hard rain of the night before many others would have driven up in cars and increased Denison's representation at the festivities.
It was a good natured crowd that gathered at the station yesterday morning, and there were members of the two local German societies with their families. Then there was the local band dressed in firemen's uniforms and plenty of music was furnished before the train pulled out. The band played selections at Deloit, Hoyer and Kiron, and upon arriving at Schleswig the Denison contingent formed in line and, headed by the band, marched up town.
Schleswig had made ample preparation for this annual German day celebration and nothing was left undone to furnish the visitors with plenty of amusement. There were free street attractions, races, sports, cono racks, nigger baby stands and in fact everything to be found at street fairs and carnivals. Three brass bands furnished music throughout the entire day, the bands from Manning and Ida Grove being present.

The crowd began to come about 10:20 and before noon the streets were packed with the jolliest and best natured crowd you ever saw. A large platform erected at a street intersection was used for the free attractions and Theo. Rohwer, who had charge of the entertainment, mounted the platform and in a short address of welcome announced the attractions. First came a wrestling match, which was one of the cleverest stunts ever pulled off in the locality, and this was followed by some acrobatic features and then the crowd was treated to some very fine trick bicycle riding.
