Her last illness was of about two months' duration. She went into a decline incident to old age and gradually grew weaker until death ensued. Her life ended Saturday evening about 6:30.

The closing of that glorious day with a golden sunset was but typical of the ending of the beautiful life she had lived. She had spent nearly a century in this world and the good this grand old lady had accomplished in these years can never be measured.

Susan Belle Slater was born in Ohio Dec. 21, 1823, and died in Council Bluffs Oct. 17, 1914, aged 90 years, 9 months and 27 days. She was married in her native state to Howard Chambers in 1840. To this union three children were born, namely: Mary Ann, John and Morris, the former and latter having preceded the mother to the grave. In the earlier years of married life the family turned their faces toward the golden west and journeyed as far as Cedar county, Iowa, where they resided for fifteen years. They then moved to Shelby county and located near Defiance, where for twenty-four years they made their home. The husband and father died there in February, 1885, after which Mrs. Chambers made her home with relatives. About six years ago she again took up the duties of home life and she and her son, John, settled in Council Bluffs, at which place she lived until her death. She leaves to mourn her departure one son, John, of Council Bluffs; one sister in California, besides scores of other relatives and friends. She had been a consistent member of the United Brethren church for many years. The funeral was held Monday from the Methodist church in Defiance and she was laid to rest by the side of her husband—the husband who had cared for her through sixty years of married life. Interment was made in the Defiance cemetery. Her casket was wreathed in beautiful flowers, a silent tribute from relatives and friends who loved her.
