## REPUBLICANS MAKE CLEAN SWEEP IN IOWA

Cummins Is An Easy Winner and  
Clarke is Elected—Democrats,  
However, Claim Victory.

### NEW YORK GOES REPUBLICAN

Crawford County Elected Klinker for  
Representative and Henry Kolls for  
Supervisor Over Carey

Des Moines, Nov. 4.—Scattered returns from Des Moines and out-state precincts indicated the reelection of Senator Albert B. Cummins (Rep.) over Maurice Connolly (Dem.) and Casper Shenk (Prog.) by a plurality of more than 40,000.

The first thirty precincts heard from out of 2,297 in Iowa gave Clarke (Rep.) for governor, 2,397; Hamilton (Dem.) 2,439. Twenty of the precincts reporting are in Des Moines.

### N. Y. STATE REPUBLICAN

Republican Governor Elected to the  
Chagrin of Roosevelt—Progressive  
Candidate Runs Third

Oyster Bay, Nov. 3.—According to the latest reports here Whitman, the republican candidate for governor of this state, has been elected; Davernport, the progressive candidate, was running a poor third, with Sulzer, the democratic candidate, second. The progressive candidates throughout the

state are making a poor showing. Theodore Roosevelt, who has supported the progressive candidate for governor, was chagrined over his defeat and went to bed early when it was learned that Whitman was running ahead. Citizens here are beginning to wonder what will become of "The Bull Moose."

## KLINKER AND KOLLS ELECTED

Klinker Wins Over Downey for Representative and Henry Kolls Defeats Carey for Supervisor.

### CASWELL CARRIES THE COUNTY.

No Well Organized Effort Against Him and Many Republicans Helped to Injure His Election.

It is difficult to predict with anything like absolute accuracy the result of the general election held on yesterday. The vote, however, appears to show that the trend of American thought is toward the republican party and that in two years it will be completely rehabilitated and in the saddle again. The Roosevelt sentiment has largely evaporated except in certain localities. The vote in the eastern states clearly shows that the seal of condemnation of the voters was placed upon the present administration. Woodrow Wilson will discover great difficulty to find any consolation in the vote of yesterday.

### "UNCLE JOE" CANNON ELECTED.

Ex-Speaker of the House Reported to Be Leading His Opponent With a Big Majority.

Danville, Ill., Nov. 3.—It is believed that the voters of the Eighteenth district have returned Joseph G. Cannon to congress for his twentieth term. Incomplete returns indicate that the former speaker of the house has defeated Congressman Frank T. O'Hair, who ousted Cannon two years ago, by 3,599 votes.

### Germans Forming New Base.

Official dispatches made public by the French embassy announced that the Germans retreating before the Russian armies in Poland are now basing on Edlinsk, Radom and Iza. The Germans were said to have lost prisoners and ammunition. The dispatch added: "In Galicia the combat continues on the entire front with success for the Russians. In a series of operations along the frontier between the Moselle and the Vesges we were able to dislodge some of the outposts of the enemy. Prisoners were captured almost everywhere."

### Accident Cause of Big Clinton Vote

Clinton, Ia., Nov. 4.—An exceptionally heavy vote was cast here, due to the disabling of the electric service which forced the factories to close during the forenoon.

## GREAT BRITAIN AND TURKEY ARE AT WAR

Sultan's Apology Comes Too Late, Says Czar—The Young Turks Are in Favor of War.

### TURKISH BARRACKS DESTROYED

Party Seems Strong Enough to Prevent Porte From Making Any Further Concessions

Great Britain and Turkey are at war, and Germany has recruited an ally in the east. After twenty-four hours of uncertainty, during which hope was expressed that the portie might make amends for the incidents in the Black sea, the British admiralty announced that a British warship had been bombed and had destroyed the Turkish barracks at Akabab, on the Turco-Egyptian frontier.

Russia has replied to Turkey's apology for the raids of its navy in the Black sea with the fateful words "too late," and it is thought hardly likely that diplomatic pressure will prevent the war party among the Young Turks from dragging their country into the European imbroglio.

### WARNS JEWS TO KEEP MUM

Russia Holds They Imperil Selves by Giving German Information.

A semi-official Russian note denies the German allegations that Jews are being persecuted in Poland. "Unfortunately, in contravention of article 41 of The Hague convention," the note says, "the enemy's troops operating in Russian territory are exacting from the Jewish population information concerning our army and means of defense, thus making the population liable to inevitable responsibilities."

### MORE TROOPS FROM CANADA

Next Contingent Will Consist of 15,000 Men.

Ottawa, Ont., Nov. 4.—Canada's next contingent of soldiers for service in Europe will consist of 15,000 men.

The British war office has asked that the second expeditionary force from the Dominion shall be organized to bring the extra men of the first contingent, which went to England some weeks ago, up to the strength of an army division.

At present Canada has in the mother country a full army division of between 21,000 and 22,000 men and four additional battalions of infantry.
