## WILLIAM DOBLER LAID TO REST

One of Crawford County's Earliest Settlers Passes Away at His Home After Lingering Illness

CAME TO COUNTY IN YEAR 1877 Unusually Successful in Accumulating His Share of Worldly Goods—Family is Well Provided For.

Vail, May 19—Special— On last Thursday, May 13, 1915, at 11 o'clock p. m., occurred the death of Mr. William Doblér at his home east of Vail, after a lingering illness with liver trouble and complications. William Lincoln Doblér was born on Nov. 13, 1851, in Pittsburgh, Penn., being at the time of his death 63 years and 6 months of age. He came with his parents to Clinton county, Iowa, in 1857, and in 1877 he moved to Crawford county and has resided here since. In 1875 he was united in marriage to Miss Lavina Kendall at Wellton, Iowa, who preceded him in death in November, 1911. Five children were born to them. They are Mrs. Gertrude Dickenson, of Lander, Wyo.; George P., of Riverton, Wyo.; Mrs. Catherine North, who lives south of town, and Miss Clara and Kendall on the old homestead. Five brothers and one sister also survive, John, of Davenport; George, of Stratton, Neb.; Edward, of West Side; Joe, of DeWitt; Lewis, of Garber, Okla.; and Mrs. O. P. Cornish, of Elwood, Iowa. All his children were present at the funeral. Mr. Doblér was one of Crawford county's early settlers and has been unusually successful in accumulating his share of the world's goods. He was a kind father, a true friend and neighbor and will be greatly missed by all who knew him. The family have the sympathy of all in their bereavement. The funeral was held on Sunday morning at St. John's church, services being conducted by Rev. Alen Judd, of Des Moines. Interment was made in the Vail cemetery. Many old friends of the deceased from a distance attended the funeral. Those who attended the casket were C. T. Wood, Clark White, Chas. Rasmussen, John Knowles, Maurice Casey and E. T. Ryan.
