Care of Cream During Summer.

Because of the general butter market conditions, quality is more important than ever before. Whether the butter is made on the farm or at the creamery, its quality depends largely upon the manner in which the cream and milk are handled.

When the milk comes from the cow it is absolutely pure, but the contamination starts from the time it leaves the teat until placed in the vat at the creamery.

When the milk is drawn it has a temperature of 98 degrees Fahrenheit, which is just right for the development of bacteria.

The cream separator as well as the milk utensils used should all be thoroughly washed with a brush.

Shotgun cans offer the best means of cooling cream because of their small diameter and the amount of surface exposed to the water in comparison with the amount of cream contained.

Those who are producing the best grade of cream have constructed milk houses. These are inexpensive and are located near the pump.

Every farmer will be well repaid for constructing a small tank and handling his cream in a sanitary manner.



