GREAT BATTLE OF CAMERON DAM

People of This Vicinity Given An Opportunity to See Moving Pictures... of John F. Deltz Family.

MANY REMEMBER THE TRAGEDY Deltz Family Ejected From Home by Large Lumber Interests in the State of Wisconsin.

On Friday evening, July 9th, the people of Denison and vicinity will have an opportunity to witness the great battles of the Cameron dam portrayed in motion pictures. This tragedy occurred in the timber regions of northern Wisconsin a few years ago in which the family of John F. Deltz fought for possession of the Cameron dam against the owners of a powerful lumber company. Mr. Deltz, a son of John F. Deltz, called at the Review office on Tuesday and gave us the story of the tragedy, which is as follows:

John F. Deltz was in the employ of the Chipewas Lumber Company from 1901 to 1904. He was to receive as pay for his labor 80 acres of cut over land at \$2.50 per acre. In the meantime a railroad had been built through that section of the country and the land value had risen to \$20 per acre.

The Thornapple river runs through the 80 acre tract and the Cameron dam was built on this land. Mr. Deltz then refused to allow the company to close the dam so as to get a head of water in which to float their logs. Then began the battle between the deputies, the settler and the company. A son and a daughter were waylaid and shot. There was a pitched battle between the deputies and the man who was defending his home and family. More than a thousand bullets were fired into this little cabin. The dams above the Cameron were blown up and when the avalanche of water and logs came down upon the Cameron it swept everything before it. To save the lives of his family Mr. Deltz finally gave himself up. During the fight a deputy was shot. Although it could not be proven that a bullet from Mr. Deltz's gun did the deed, yet he was convicted on circumstantial evidence and sentenced to life imprisonment. Every effort is being put forth to get Governor Phillips to pardon Mr. Deltz. He has been presented with a petition containing 55,000 names of voters of the state of Wisconsin.
