CONTRACTS FOR NEW BUILDING

J. C. Dyson, of Manilla, to Erect a Modern Business House—Contract Awarded and Work Begun.

8,200 SQUARE FEET FLOOR SPACE

Interior Will be Elegantly Furnished With Modern Cases and Shelving—Other Manilla Items.

Manilla, Aug. 3.—(Special to the Review)—Contractor E. Y. Turpin secured the contract Tuesday for the erection of a new brick store building for J. C. Dyson, and work is already begun.

The building will be 40x50 feet, one story with a 40 foot front. The main entrance will be eight feet from the east corner. The west window will be 24 feet with east and side plate windows 8 feet each. The first floor will consist of a 40 foot sales basement extending under the sidewalk and lighted from the front walk by prism glass 3 feet wide and 20 feet long. Back of this basement room will be located the furnace and fuel room, and adjoining this the brick addition built two years ago with a space 40x25 feet.

The first floor storeroom to be added to the old will be 40x30. At the rear and west side of the floor will be located a ladies' rest room and toilet. West of this room is located a room for ladies' ready to wear clothing, etc.

The new building will be of brick and the front elevation will be of up-to-date architecture. When completed Mr. Dyson will have 8,200 square feet of floor space. The interior will be elegantly furnished and equipped with new and modern show cases, shelving, etc., and throughout everything will be modern.

The frame building will be moved out on the street and with favorable weather the new building will be all ready to occupy by September 15th.

Effects of Rain in 1851.

It is to be hoped that the heavy rains which have been experienced in large portions of Iowa this year will not have the results which followed a similar rainy season in 1851. A member of the research staff of the State Historical Society of Iowa recently found the following reminiscence concerning that year:

"The flood, the failure of crops, and the sickness in Iowa made many dissatisfied and anxious to leave the country, and many of them who could, disposed of their farms and left the state. The prospects of rapidly accumulating great wealth west of the Rocky mountains, and almost a famine in Iowa because of the wet season, had such an effect on the citizens that the future prospects of the state were very gloomy and unpropitious. Business became stagnant, many houses and farms were tenantless, many sold their possessions at reduced prices and it seemed for a while as if everybody were bound to leave Iowa.
