The American dollar rates the financial world—not through the wisdom of the democratic law makers, but through the folly of those European rulers who precipitated the most ruinous war in the world's history. Our own economic system is just as weak at the foundation today as it was in July, 1914, when the balance of trade was running higher and higher against us. We have been saved from disaster not by our own action, but by the extreme necessities of our unfortunate cousins across the Atlantic. Foolish, foolish indeed, the man who deludes himself with the idea that such an economic structure can endure beyond the day when its foundation falls.

That the "prosperity" of the country is highly concentrated in the territory of the "war bride" establishments finds new confirmation in a table compiled by a New York stock exchange house. The table compares the prices of various classes of stocks at the beginning of the war and at the present time; and it is significant that the stocks of railroads—the one basic and fundamental and nation wide industry—are but two per cent higher than they were a year ago. But the "war bride" stocks have meantime risen to an average of 87 per cent higher; motor stocks 82 per cent; steel and equipment stocks 87 per cent; metal stocks 40 per cent; can stocks 54 per cent and electric and sugar stocks about 40 per cent higher than a year ago.

Fist Fighting.

Some interest has been excited by a recent petition sent to the navy department, that fist fighting be permitted the students in naval schools in settling personal disputes, as a means of promoting manliness.

But in mature life the trouble with physical combat is that it does not settle the justice of disputes. The big man, heavy in beef and brutal in muscle, becomes too arrogant. The fact that a man is puny of stature does not mean that he has no justice in his cause. If he must suffer not merely the original wrong, but a licking in the attempt to right it, his lot is indeed hard. As the principle of arbitration spreads, the power of the fist diminishes.
