ENDORSED AT HOME.

Such Proof As This Should Convince Any Denison Citizen. The public endorsement of a local citizen is the best proof that can be produced.

The new form of application asks the name of the owner of the car, post office, county, street number, make of the car, factory number, model, number of cylinders, bore of cylinders, style of car, power, previous registration, name and address of the former owner and date of purchase.

On the back of the card is a form showing the fees required for every car manufactured. Machines used four years prior to August 1st will be registered for one-half of the regular rate.

Under the new law all fees are due January 1st, 10 per cent penalty will be added; if they are not paid before April 1st, and 5 per cent additional for each month thereafter.
