CORNER STONE KIRON SCHOOL

Carl F. Kuehnle Makes Speech at Laying of Corner Stone of New School House at Kiron.

HOPES OF CITIZENS REALIZED

Notable Event of Kiron and Vicinity—VanNess and Supt. Oiry Present and Give Talks.

Kiron, Oct. 4.—(Special to the Review)—Saturday afternoon an event transpired that will be remembered as a notable one, when the corner stone to the Kiron independent school building was laid, and the exercises which were of special interest to the Kironites were held, which were listened to by a goodly number. Until this fall Kiron has had no school and many frequent were the remarks made by strangers visiting our most fair and progressive town about there being no school in town. Had Kiron built a school years ago there would have been several more families residing here. The children have been sent to a couple of buildings a mile west of town, which have been called school houses (oh, save the name). Kiron finally determined by a majority vote of its citizens to establish an independent district and a beautiful four room building is being erected. Rev. N. N. Morten, pastor of the Baptist church, was asked to take charge of the exercises, which he did in his pleasing and masterly way, and his remarks were practical and convincing and assisted in the very agreeable and enjoyable program. Rev. Irvin Johnson, of the Free church, opened with prayer, after which Hon. Carl F. Kuehnle, of Denison, Iowa's next governor, was introduced, and delivered a splendid address which contained spice and truths that were listened to by those present with the greatest of interest. There was only one fault with his speech, and that was that it was too short. Co. Supt. F. N. Oiry made a brief address on the progress of school work and its betterment of late years, and commended Kiron in its step to secure what is due them, and what it has been deprived of in the past—a better school. Following his address the masons placed the corner stone in place. It had the names of the members of the school board inscribed upon it. After the corner stone had been placed Prof. W. C. VanNess, of the Denison college, was introduced and he spoke in his able way and commended the people in the addition to their beautiful town, the beautiful building which is under erection, and stated that not alone will it be a splendid acquisition as an improvement, but great value will be derived from the educational resources it will afford. After singing "America" the people were dismissed. The weather was ideal and quite a number turned out to participate in the event.



Culvert Tiles Investigated. Very interesting investigations are being carried on by the state engineering experiment station at Ames to determine the strength of culvert tile which is being used throughout the state.

In Montgomery county it has been found that fully 50 per cent of the culvert tile used there is cracking. This is due to the weight of the earth itself and the immense burden it has to bear from heavy tractor traffic.

The experiments, when finished, will furnish data on the real strength of various tiles and the required strength of such tiles to successfully withstand heavy country traffic.
