WOMAN'S SUFFRAGE DEFEATED

Three States, New York, Massachusetts and Pennsylvania, Disapprove Proposed Amendments. REPUBLICAN PARTY COMES BACK Early Returns Indicate Grand Old Party Regains Power in State of Pennsylvania. According to the news dispatches today voters in three states, New York, Massachusetts and Pennsylvania, at the election held yesterday, indicated their disapproval of woman suffrage by overwhelming majorities. Proposed amendments to the constitutions of the three states were hopelessly beaten. In New York woman suffrage was more popular than in the other two states, but even there a majority against it appeared to be 99,000 more. In Massachusetts a majority against woman suffrage was more than 80,000, practically two-thirds of the voters opposing the measure. In Pennsylvania the amendment was lost by an overwhelming vote. From early returns in the states, holding elections it seems that the republicans have come back to their own. This was particularly true of Pennsylvania, where after a contest waged with great vigor on the part of the reform ticket, the republican organization won a notable victory. In New York state returns from eighteen of the larger cities in the state show twelve republican, five democratic and one socialist mayors elected. In New Jersey, where the election involved mainly the control of the next legislature, the republicans won out. It will make the next state senate stand 22 republicans to 8 democrats, a republican gain of 2. The next house of representatives in New Jersey will be constituted, 37 republicans and 23 democrats. A republican was elected in Massachusetts and a gain was made in Kentucky and the republicans won an additional congressman in New York state. From Maryland the returns indicate that the democrats have gained a governor. Prohibition measures were voted up in Ohio and Virginia. Returns from the first state showed a defeat of the measure by a majority of about 40,000, while Virginia, on the other hand, elected a state legislature pledged to enact measures in 1916 prohibiting the sale of intoxicants. HILTON FINED \$5.00 AND COSTS. Proprietor of Bus Barn Pleads Guilty to Charges Preferred Against Him by Landlord Thos. Nielsen. John Hilton, owner of the bus barn, was arrested yesterday afternoon on information filed against him by Mr. Thos. Nielsen, proprietor of the Hotel Denison, and fined five dollars and costs by Mayor Laffer when he pleaded guilty to the charge of not complying with the city ordinance governing common carriers. It seems that Mr. Hilton failed to make a number of the passenger trains both yesterday morning and afternoon, greatly inconveniencing people who wished to make the train and passengers who desired to ride up town from the station. The city council only recently passed an ordinance regulating common carriers and in this ordinance it is stated that common carriers must make all passenger trains and arrive at the depot not less than ten minutes before the scheduled departure of the train. Mr. Hilton admitted that he failed to comply with this new ordinance and was guilty of the charge made against him. There has been no end of complaint in regard to the bus and cab service in the city since the Hiltons took charge of it. It has not been an unpleasent thing for people to miss their trains on account of the bus driver failing to call at residences and the hotels for passengers who had telephoned asking for the bus. We believe that people who engage in this business should handle it in a businesslike manner or should step aside and allow someone who would conduct the business satisfactorily to take hold of it. It is a matter that if the present owners do not intend to give service or show some disposition to do so their license should be revoked.
