## AUTO NUMBERS FROM AUDITOR?

Owners of Cars Declare That the Numbers Could Be Distributed Locally More Conveniently.

WOULD BE A SAVING TO STATE

Under the Present Plan the State Office is Swamped and the Distribution is Delayed.

Many of the automobile owners of Iowa are advocating a change in the system of issuing automobile number plates. They favor payment of the registration fee to the state, and issuance of the plates by the county auditor.

The proposed change would avoid the congestion at the secretary of state's office and would save the state about \$10,000 on the distribution of the plates, the automobile men say.

The plates which are now being issued will be good until Dec. 31, 1918. In 1919 there will be another distribution of plates, if the system of issuing numbers for a three year period proves a success in Iowa. When the new distribution is undertaken, the economist faction wants the plates shipped by freight to the county auditors, and that they be issued from the courthouse.

Congestion at Times.

"There has always been a congestion at the automobile department at the state house at certain periods." "During the last few days there has been so heavy a demand for plates that the people have to line up and take their turn. In addition the applications for numbers are pouring into the office through the mails at the rate of 3,000 a day.

"The state pays 7 cents to mail out each pair of plates to points within the first zone and 10 cents to points in the second zone. The cost to the department is \$10,500.

More Than 150,000 Cars.

"There is every indication that the number of cars registered this year will greatly exceed 150,000 and by 1919 there will be perhaps 250,000 cars in the state. All of these owners sending in to one central point for plates creates a rush that strains any organization to meet.

"The plan of having the county auditors hand out the plates is being tried out in Colorado with good success. The car owners send their fees to the state and they get a receipt by return mail, with the number assigned them. They then go to the county auditor and get their plate.

"Each county auditor is supplied with plates at the beginning of a year. All plates issued in a certain county are of a certain series. This aids greatly in locating the home of the car, if it is stolen.

"Polk county has nearly 6,000 automobiles. Under the system proposed, 6,000 numbers would be assigned to this county. There would be no confusion or difficulty in handing out the plates at the court house. No additional help would be required.
