April 30th: Peter Delivered from Prison. Acts: 12:1-19.

We have for our lesson this week, one of the most interesting portions of the New Testament. The verses read like a story book. While all is well that ends well, yet the early Christian church passed through a great crisis in this lesson, and the Christians of that day were fearful that all would not end well for the beloved Peter and the cause which he represented.

How human indeed were the early Christians when they could not believe that their prayers would be literally answered while they were yet praying. Our prayers now must be accompanied by faith that they will be answered.

It is an oft expressed thought that "man's extremity is God's opportunity." The early Christians set an example which has been followed thousands of times since, of meeting for prayer and earnestly beseeching God to spare Peter's life.

The next day there was much stir in the prison over the loss and the men who should have guarded the prisoner were put to death for failing to hold their man.

Those were vital times, in the history of the early church. There was need of a showing of direct divine care for the leaders, of such discouragement would come as to fan out the little band at Jerusalem. It is told that Paul, when in prison at Philippi, sang in the night. The prison did not so worry Peter that he failed to sleep on the eventful night. It is clear that these leaders who were suffering for the sake of the gospel had that something in their hearts which gave comfort and peace.

The action of the Christian band in coming together for prayer has many lessons for us. There are many promises that prayer will avail with God. Jesus said so, and Paul gave the same assurance. Jesus prayed often and told us also to pray. He said that our Father in Heaven was even more ready to give good gifts to His believers than earthly parents were to give to their children: This is certainly encouraging.

**A Premature Reform.**

Hatjan Republican: Every so often the matter of narrowing the country roads of the state comes up for discussion. The discussion is on now. The state has about 100,000 miles of road, most of it about four rods wide. If the width were cut down to two rods four acres of land per mile would be returned to adjacent farms, or about 100,000 acres in all. This land at \$150 per acre, would be worth about \$60,000,000. Roads could easily be narrowed in level sections, in hilly sections not. The width is needed for the cuts which will have to be made. When population becomes dense and land hunger greater, say in about fifty to seventy-five years, no doubt the roads will be narrowed.

For example—one firm of horse and mule buyers in Kansas City has, in the past eighteen months, paid out \$60,000,000 for animals for shipment to Europe. 
