This location is convenient for the farm laborers to leave data and other information in regard to work and repairs needed as they come to their meals. In cases of emergency the farm office might become an improvised bedroom. This room does not need to be large; 8x10 feet or even 6x8 will often times prove to be of ample size. Township Picnics Held. Modern farm houses should be so planned that one room will be available as a farm office, says the agricultural engineering department of Iowa State college. The average Iowa farm today requires a good deal of clerical work if the business is properly transacted and the proper accounts kept. Not many farms are large enough to provide an office separate from the farm house. A location in the rear of the house, with windows which will provide a good view of the farm buildings and the service yard, is the most satisfactory.
