County Agents to Get Plans.

In order that the widest use may be made of the farm building plans available for distribution by the department of agricultural engineering of the agricultural extension department of Iowa State college, a complete blue print set of these drawings, 97 in all, including over 300 blue prints, will be placed in the offices of every county agent in Iowa who wants them. They are being made up in two volume sets and will be bound in a complete index has been made for them, so that any farmer wanting a building plan can visit the office of his county agent and quickly select the plan he wants. Then blue prints of the plan can be secured from Ames at a nominal cost of five cents a sheet.

Fourteen complete sets have already been made up as a first edition of the plans for as many county agents who have asked for them. The sets include plans for houses, general barns, horse, cattle and dairy barns, Iowa sun-lit community hog houses, self feeders for swine, silos, machine sheds, water tanks, corn cribs, poultry houses, ice houses, smoke houses, potato and apple storage sheds and many other smaller farm buildings and equipment. Most of the plans were designed by the agricultural engineering section of the Iowa experiment station.
