Diets and Health.
The interesting experiment conducted by Chicago Health commissioner with a diet squad is a revelation of what can be accomplished by a wise choice of foods at a very moderate cost. The squad was fed for 31c a day per person, and they gained an average of 3.8 pounds.
The modern dining table is loaded

with food that is not nourishing. Cereals with vital elements refined out and pies and cakes are the backbone of our diet. People may be principled against eating much candy, but they make it up by sweets served three times a day and eaten at lunches. Meals are bolted so rapidly that little of the nutriment can help build up the body. People eat bread, meat, and vegetable until they have had enough, and then pile on top of it a hearty dessert of confections. Over-eating can't be nourishing. But when a man's chief end in life is the fun he has with knife, fork, and spoon, it isn't much use to preach to him the results of diet squads.


