SQUARE DEAL HOPED FOR.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Dec. 12.—(Special Correspondence)—Americans who have investments in property and industries in Mexico are still wondering whether the administration has changed its attitude toward them, and they are earnestly hoping that it has. They were led to believe that a change had taken place when it was announced recently that the republic of China had borrowed \$5,000,000 from the Continental and Commercial National bank of Chicago, and the state department had approved the transaction. The sum is not large, as international loans go, but the incident indicated that a marked change had come over the spirit of the administration since those early days of 1913 when the president compelled the American participants to withdraw from their contemplated share in a much larger loan to be granted to the Chinese government and known as the six-power agreement. The position which the state department then took was that there was some financial immorality attaching to such a proceeding and that a virtuous administration could not afford to be connected with it, even by implication.

Before concluding the recent loan, the Chicago bankers submitted the proposed contract to Secretary Lansing for scrutiny; and before the document was executed they received a letter from the secretary in which he gave his approval to the proceeding and added: "It is the policy of the department, now as in the past, to give all proper diplomatic support and protection to the legitimate enterprises abroad of American citizens."

These last words gave satisfaction to the American capitalists who have invested their money in Mexico, although there is still a loophole in whatever interpretation the administration may put upon the words "legitimate enterprises." One of the outstanding grievances of Americans who have undertaken the development of railroads, mines and oil fields in Mexico is that they have been denied the proper protection of this government in their operations. The Lansing letter, accordingly, affords a ray of hope to those unfortunate persons who have their money wrapped up in enterprises south of the Rio Grande, and the expectation is that the letter, coupled with an apparent purpose to hold Carranza to a more "strict accountability," may give a chance for American investors to recoup the losses which they have sustained through the onslaughts of Carranza and Villa and whoever else has exercised power in Mexico.

The apparent change of heart the administration has experienced is no less gratifying than unlooked for.

JAPANESE PROSPERITY

It has been known for a long time that the European war was making almost as many millionaires in Japan as

In New York. While Japan is technically at war, she has taken part in none of the fighting except in the early days when she seized Kiauchau.

Concrete evidence of Japan's prosperity is presented in the announcement that merchants and exporters of that country have bought between \$30,000,000 and \$50,000,000 worth of American securities in the last six months. These Japanese investments on so large a scale are the outgrowth of the shift of commerce resulting from the war. Certain classes of goods formerly manufactured and exported by Germany are now being sent to the United States by Japan. Moreover, certain classes of goods which always have been exported by Japan now face a falling off in demand from the European belligerents and Japan is sending her surplus to the United States, whose low tariff invites this sort of competition. Japan also is profiting by the manufacture of munitions.

It is largely due to the superabundance of money in Japan that investments are being made in American stocks and bonds. In addition to the investments in American securities, the Japanese have been drawing slightly upon the American gold supply, \$2,000,000 having been transferred recently to the San Francisco mint for shipment to Japan. Three months ago it was stated that approximately \$30,000,000 of Japanese government funds held in New York had to be sent to London to be used in the purchase of British treasury notes. Japan's prosperity is one of these natural consequences of the European war, and it is giving her a decided advantage in the extension and up-building of the very industries which after the war will be in sharpest competition with the industries of the United States.—Washington Post.
