Resolved by the board of supervisors of Crawford county, Iowa, that, whereas it is proposed to make changes in existing roads and additions to present established roads and to establish new roads in accordance with the recommendations set forth in the reports of H. B. Fishel, county engineer of Crawford county, Iowa, to said board of supervisors under dates of Feb. 20, 1917, and March 6, 1917, and whereas said board is unable to acquire the necessary right of way for said proposed changes, additions and new roads by agreement with the owners of the lands through which lands said proposed road will run, that P. J. Portz as county auditor of Crawford county, Iowa, be and is hereby directed to appoint three appraisers who shall appraise the damages sustained by the several land owners through whose lands said proposed rights of way shall extend, said appraisers to make appraisal and report within ten days from date of their appointment.

The board of supervisors of Crawford county, in the state of Iowa, met in regular session pursuant to law, to the rules of said board and to adjournment.

The meeting was called to order by the chairman and the roll being called there was present Hans Hagge, chairman in the chair, and the following named supervisors: John Holland, Martin Nehls, C. J. Bohnsack and H. C. Kolls.

Absent: None.

Supervisor H. C. Kolls introduced and read the resolution next hereinafter set out and moved its adoption, seconded by Supervisor John Holland, and after due consideration thereof

by the board, the chairman put the question upon the adoption of said resolution, and the roll being called the following named supervisors voted: Aye: Hagge, Holland, Nehls, Bohnsack, Kolls, Nay: None.

Whereupon the chairman declared said resolution adopted as follows: RESOLUTION.

Whereas, in a resolution, regularly adopted by the board of supervisors of Crawford county, Iowa, on the 9th day of February, A. D. 1917, relative to the issuing of \$155,000.00 funding bonds in which the form of said bond and the interest coupons to be attached thereto were fully set out, and whereas it is desired that certain details of said bonds and coupons be changed and modified, be it therefore resolved by the board of supervisors of Crawford county, Iowa, that the form of said funding bonds and the form of said coupons thereto attached be modified and changed to read as follows:

FORM OF BOND. No. \$ United States of America. State of Iowa, County of Crawford.

FUNDING BOND. The county of Crawford, in the state of Iowa, for value received promises to pay the bearer one thousand dollars lawful money of the United States of America on the first day of February, A. D. 1937, or at the option of said county before the last above named date at any interest paying period on or after the 15th day of April, A. D. 1927, together with interest on said sum from the date hereof until paid, at the rate of four per centum per annum, payable on the 15th day of October, 1927, and semiannually thereafter on the 15th day of April and October in each year, and at maturity, upon the presentation and surrender of the interest coupons hereto attached as they severally become due, both principal and interest of this bond are hereby made payable at The Farmers Loan & Trust company, in the city of Sioux City, state of Iowa, with exchange, and for the prompt payment of this bond, both principal and interest at maturity, the full faith and credit of said county are hereby irrevocably pledged.

This bond is issued by the board of supervisors of said county pursuant to and in strict compliance with the provisions of Sections 403 et seq., Chapter 1, Title 4 of the Code of Iowa, as amended and in conformity with a resolution of said board duly passed for the purpose of funding a like amount of the valid, subsisting indebtedness of said county, outstanding on the first day of January, 1917, and until the issuance of this bond.

And it is hereby certified and recited: that all acts, conditions and things required by the laws and constitution of the state of Iowa, to be done precedent to and in the issuance of this bond have been properly done, happened and been performed in regular and due form as required by law, and that the indebtedness funded by the issuance of this bond was a valid, subsisting and legal indebtedness of said county, and that the total indebtedness of said county including this bond does not exceed the constitutional or statutory limitations.

In testimony whereof said county by its board of supervisors has caused this bond to be signed by the chairman of the board, and attested by the auditor with the seal of the county affixed, as of the first day of February, 1917.

FORM OF COUPON No. 1 No. \$28.33 On the 15th day of October, 1917, the treasurer of Crawford county, Iowa, will pay to bearer twenty-eight dollars and thirty-three cents, lawful money of the United States of America, at the Farmers Loan & Trust company, at Sioux City, Iowa, with exchange, for 8 1/2 months' interest due that date on its funding bonds dated Feb. 1, 1917.

Be it further resolved, that said bonds and coupons shall be issued and dates and amounts set forth therein to correspond with the dates the said interest coupons shall fall due and for the amounts due on the respective interest paying dates and that all resolutions or parts of resolutions in conflict herewith be and the same are hereby repealed.
