Oct. 21—Temple Rebuilt and Dedicated. Ezra 3: 8-13; 6: 14-18.

Last Sunday we had called to mind the return of the Jewish tribes of Judah and Benjamin from their captivity at Babylon. They went under royal command to return to Jerusalem and there rebuild their temple, the walls of the city and the habitations generally.

The returning Hebrews arrived and began their work only to have it hindered by reports to the king at Babylon that they were dangerous people and that if they were left unmolested to build they would rebel at the first opportunity. In time, however, such a showing was made before King Darius that they were encouraged to go on building. The lesson of today tells of the joyful day when the great temple was finally rebuilt and dedicated.


It was a joyful day, and then again it was not. The older Jews remembered the splendor of the great temple built by Solomon and its magnificence and they could not keep from bewailing the misfortune which had come on their people in its loss by the hand of their enemies. It was, however, a great day when the priests in robes of office, and instruments of music used by the priests, sang, played and chanted the familiar words and music of the olden times. In our modern days they might well have sang "This is the Crowning Day."

Back again to Jerusalem. Yes indeed, but it was not the same as in the days of yore. That awful gap of history when the city was despoiled and the inhabitants either put to death or taken into bondage loomed up between the old days. This situation reminds one of the condition of the man or woman who was once a Christian and then fell from grace into sin, and later comes to himself and finds pardon in sins repented of and forgiven. It is true they are again in connection with God, on praying ground, and to outer appearances the same as before, but surface indications do not tell the full story. The events of the past are not wiped out of memory and there will ever be the feeling of regret that the lapse from perfect fellowship ever came about. It is a mistake for one to try sowing wild oats with the idea that in time they can reform, turn to God, and be the same in life as if sin had not been cherished in the heart for a season.

The temple which was now dedicated was the same one which Jesus visited, when in due time He came to earth. Thus it is linked up to the New Testament dispensation. God had been indeed good to these Jews in that He found a way for them to get back to their beloved city, and again have the temple worship founded by David and Solomon. They had been taken away as a punishment for their wrong doing and almost miraculously returned. Many people on looking back on their lives rejoice indeed that God took them again under His special care, put their feet on solid rock and helped build them up again in religious ways. Thanks be to God for His great gift of Jesus to the world, and thus salvation from sin and wrong doings.
