Wheat, barley and rye can not be fed to hogs and other livestock. Cecil Barnes, head of the United States grain corporation, a branch of the food administration, has wired to the administrator for Indiana as follows: "Barley and rye are cereals good for human consumption and should not be fed to animals where other grain is available..."

Food Administrator Deems, of Burlington, has notified county food administrators that if they feel there is necessity for the service of extra meals to threshers, or for providing of extra quantities of flour in specific cases, they are authorized to use their judgment in such matters, and issue special orders accordingly.

Gus Martin, of Ute, reports another year's success in the production of clover seed for the market, stating that his crop this year will net him \$120 per acre. He says that the crop does best on rolling land and that it excels all other legumes in restoring land and in being pretty well winter killed this spring, but nevertheless, it is expected to yield from twenty-five to thirty bushels to the acre, Dr. Coon tells me. With wheat selling for more than two dollars per bushel it will be a very profitable crop.

John Schurkey, living four miles north of Deloit, reports a little rust in his wheat, and so does one of his neighbors, but he will have a bumper crop, however. He has fifteen acres of it and his oats are also good. He built a garage, 10x18, this summer and wants to build a barn this fall if he can get to it.

The interstate fair grand champion Shorthorn bull, Fair Sultan, has been sold by E. J. Thompson & Son, of Hurley, S. D., to Benows Bros. of Maryville, Mo. He sold for \$17,500. He is now two years old and weighs better than 2200.
