ADVERTISEMENT FOR BIDS FOR CONSTRUCTION OF SANITARY SEWER.

Sealed proposals will be received at the office of the city clerk of Denison, Iowa, until 8 o'clock p. m. on the 2d day of September, 1918, for furnishing labor and material for the construction of a sanitary sewer on the following streets and parts of streets and alleys and parts of alleys in the city of Denison, Iowa, to-wit:

On Jefferson avenue from the intersection of Jefferson avenue and Chestnut street to the center of the intersection of Jefferson avenue and the alley running east and west through block 146 in the city of Denison, Iowa, thence west from the center of Jefferson avenue through the alley running east and west through block 146 to connect with the sewer on Washington avenue.

On High street from the north line of East Prospect street to a distance of 150 north of the north line of Sanders street.

All in Denison, Iowa, by sewerage the same with a six (6) inch salt glazed sewer pipe. The said sewer shall be constructed in accordance with plans and specifications thereof prepared by the engineer and approved by the city council of Denison, Iowa, which plans and specifications are hereby referred to and made a part of this advertisement. Manholes, flush tanks, lamp holes and other accessories shall be constructed as provided by the plans and specifications. The following is an approximate estimate of the work to be done:

2290 linear feet of sewer. 5 manholes, 2 flush tanks, 2 lamp holes.

All bids must be accompanied in a separate envelope by a certified check on a local bank payable to the order of C. L. Voss, city treasurer of the city of Denison, Iowa, in the sum of 5 per cent of bid as security that the bidder will enter into contract within ten days for the construction of the contemplated sanitary sewer and will give bond as required.

When the said contract has been completed and accepted by the city council the cost and expenses of such sanitary sewer shall be assessed against the property abutting upon the streets and alleys whereon said sewers are located and adjacent thereto within 150 feet whereon said sewers are located or to the nearest street when less than 150 feet, in accordance with the law governing said assessments and against railroad companies whose tracks are located thereon, in accordance with the law governing said assessments and to the extent that the same are assessable by law or may be paid by levying sewer taxes as provided in section 831 of the code of Iowa and amendments thereto, or may be paid from the city sewer fund or any part of said costs may be paid from any of said funds.

The contractor shall look exclusively to the funds stated in the contract for the payment for said sanitary sewer, and the city of Denison, Iowa, will not make itself pecuniarily liable for the payment of any part of the cost of said sanitary sewer and will not incur any indebtedness for the same.

The contractor shall give good and sufficient bond to be approved by the city council obligating the contractor and his bondsmen to a satisfactory performance of the contract and to keep said sanitary sewer in good repair for a period of one year after the acceptance of the same by the city council.

ORDINANCE NO. 276. An Ordinance Making It Unlawful to Stop or Accost Any Female on the Streets or Public Places of Denison for Immoral Purposes and Providing a Penalty Therefor.

Be It Ordained by the City Council of Denison, Iowa:

Section 1. It is hereby made unlawful for any person to stop or accost any female upon the streets or public places of Denison, Iowa, with the intention to solicit such female to accompany such person by automobile or otherwise for immoral purposes, and the unlawful intent shall be presumed if the parties are unacquainted with each other or either one bears a reputation for immorality.

Sec. 2. It shall be the duty of any police or other peace officer in the city of Denison, to make arrest, without warrant, of any person found violating the provisions of Section 1 of this ordinance, and retain such person for a reasonable time until formal complaint can be made and warrant issued and served.

Sec. 3. Any violation of the provisions of this ordinance shall be deemed a misdemeanor and upon conviction the person so offending shall be punished by a fine not exceeding One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars or by imprisonment for a period not exceeding thirty days.

Sec. 4. This ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage and publication as provided by law.

ORDINANCE NO. 277. An Ordinance Respecting the Illegal Sale of Intoxicating Liquors and Providing Punishment for the Violation Thereof.

Be It Ordained by the City Council of Denison, Iowa:

Section 1. Any person found selling or giving away to another in the city of Denison, intoxicating liquors, or shall be found in the said city engaged in what is commonly known as "bootlegging," shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and punished accordingly.

Sec. 2. It shall be the duty of the city marshal or any peace officer of the city, without warrant, to make arrest of any such person so found offending against this ordinance and bring him forthwith before the mayor or, in the event of the absence of the mayor or his inability to act, then before the nearest justice of the peace, where information shall be filed and a trial had.

Sec. 3. This ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage and publication as provided by law.

COLLEGE NEWS NOTES Judge Conner was the speaker at assembly last Wednesday. After touching briefly upon the value of the summer school to the young people and prospective teachers of this community, he launched into an eloquent patriotic discussion. He briefly outlined all the fundamental issues in the great conflict. His remarks were very much appreciated.

Last Friday afternoon, Miss Eulalie Turner, assisted by Miss Ida Hugin and Mrs. A. C. Fuller and several of the students, gave a picnic in Washington park for the children who had taken part in the illustrative teaching lessons given at the summer school from week to week. After games and story telling, light refreshments were served. It was a gala day for the youngsters.

On Saturday, O. Wilson gave an extra class demonstration in woodwork. This was particularly for the benefit of those teachers who were unable to enter the regular classes in woodwork. This extra work served a double purpose, that of familiarizing the teachers with the use and care of at least 12 different common tools and learning exercises that can be used profitably at twenty noon hours in rural schools. The interest and effort put forth by the teachers are ample proof of the value of the work being given by Mr. Wilson.

Thursday afternoon Miss Martha Hutchinson, adviser of women, held a conference for all of the women of the extension summer school. At this time various matters pertinent to the conduct and demeanor and welfare of young women teachers who are living away from their homes were considered, both in the light of the requirements of good society and the standards for good teachers.

Judging from the many favorable comments the afternoon was very profitably spent.

County Supt. F. N. Olry brought samples of all of the official reports required from school teachers and discussed them thoroughly before the students of the extension school on Monday afternoon. His familiarity with the need for accurate reports, as well as his official position, gave great importance to his remarks.

As a climax to the work in didactics and particularly to the work in illustrative teaching, which has been carried out throughout the entire summer school, Miss Eulalie Turner, demonstration critic teacher, assisted by Miss Ida Hugin, didactic teacher, have conducted a model rural school Tuesday and Wednesday. Particular attention has been given to the first day problems of organization and classification with the idea of giving the beginning teachers who were present and observing, the greatest amount of help on this line. It is the feeling of all that this unusual effort was amply repaid by the results obtained.

Displays of handwork are exhibited from various departments of the school, particularly in the sewing from the classes in domestic science, the handwork classes, penmanship

and woodwork. A very creditable showing was made in all these activities.

Roy Fisher-An Appreciation By Rev. J. P. Allen, Pastor

DELOIT, Aug. 20-The death of Roy Fisher at the Denison hospital, Aug. 10, 1918, brought indescribable grief to many hearts and homes in the Deloit community. Comparatively speaking, he was a stranger among us. He was born near Sedalia, Mo., April 25, 1899, and grew to young manhood near Lamar, Mo. For three successive seasons he has worked on the farm for his uncle, Murray Woolsoncroft, two miles north of Deloit, returning to his home in Missouri to spend the winters. Consequently he was not widely known here. But those with whom he came into contact were soon aware that he was a young man of unusual worth. He had the unmistakable marks of a gentleman-industrious, unassuming but friendly, clean, intelligent, sincere.

He was ambitious to obtain a good education. He had taken a term at the Warrenburg, Mo., state normal and was carefully saving his earnings for the purpose of completing the course. No one who knew him could fail to be inspired with his exceptional possibilities for a career of commanding power and usefulness. Furthermore, he was a sincere Christian. He was converted and joined the church when he was fifteen years of age. He never made a parade of his profession, neither did he attempt to hide it or apologize for it in word or action. He joined the Deloit Epworth League about a year ago and in his death it has suffered a distinct loss. But his life among us has been a restraint from evil and an inspiration for good to all our young people. His influence among us will linger down the years. His death was the very gate of heaven. His last hours were replete with prayer and praise. Triumphant he passed into the presence of his Master. We do not presume to understand the providence of God when cutting off prematurely such a promising life. Perhaps He has use for him in some higher sphere of service. But we do know that earth is richer and better because he lived in it and that the future life is more real and more blessed because of his going.

DEATH FOLLOWS OPERATION Mrs. Carl F. Jensen, of Goodrich Township, Passes Away at Hospital After Serious Operation

Mrs. Carl F. Jensen, of Goodrich township, passed away at the Denison hospital Thursday, August 15th, following a most serious operation.

Packers' Profits Are Regulated

The public should understand that the profits of the packers have been limited by the Food Administration since November 1, 1917. For this purpose, the business of Swift & Company is now divided into three classes:

Class 1 includes such products as beef, pork, mutton, oleomargarine and other meats that are essentially animal products. Profits are limited to 9 per cent of the capital employed in these departments, (including surplus and borrowed money), or not to exceed two and a half cents on each dollar of sales.

Class 2 includes the soap, glue, fertilizer, and other departments more or less associated with the meat business. Many of these departments are in competition with outside businesses whose profits are not limited. Profits in this class are restricted to 15 per cent of the capital employed.

Class 3 includes outside investments, such as those in stock yards, and the operation of packing plants in foreign countries. Profits in this class are not limited.

Total profits for all departments together in 1918 will probably be between three and four per cent on an increased volume of sales.

The restrictions absolutely guarantee a reasonable relation between live stock prices and wholesale meat prices, because the packer's profit cannot possibly average more than a fraction of a cent per pound of product.

Since the profits on meat (Class 1) are running only about 2 cents on each dollar of sales, we have to depend on the profits from soap, glue, fertilizer (Class 2, also limited) and other departments, (Class 3) to obtain reasonable earnings on capital.
