



VICTIM OF THE "FLU"

Herbert Pearson Passes Away at the Denison Hospital Sunday After Brief Illness—Funeral Monday

Herbert Pearson passed away at the Denison hospital Sunday, December 15th, at the age of 28 years, 2 months and 3 days. The cause of his death was due to pneumonia which followed an attack of influenza. Herbert was sick less than a week, but from the beginning his illness was most serious. He was taken to the Denison hospital where he might receive the best possible care.

The deceased was born at Vail on Oct. 12, 1889. He moved with his parents to Denison when a youth and attended the public schools here. After completing his education he took up masonry and plastering and was considered an expert mechanic in these lines. Eleven years ago Herbert was united in marriage to Miss Ida Vittel, who with three children are left to mourn his death. The children are Harold age 10, Javonah age 5 and a baby age 2.

Herbert Pearson was a kind and loving husband and father and his death is a severe blow to the family, all of whom are seriously ill with the pneumonia. Herbert realized on the day previous to his death that his time on earth was short and expressed the hope that he might go to his Redeemer.

Besides his wife and children he leaves to mourn his death his father and step-mother, Mr. and Mrs. Andrew Pearson, two half brothers, Leslie and Vernon Pearson, three half-sisters, Ruby and Maurine Pearson, all residents of Denison, and Mrs. J. E. Johnson, of Sioux City, and five step-sisters, namely: Dr. Anna Gelandier, of Manilla; Mrs. Walter Powley, of Glidden; Mrs. Warner Roush, of Churdan; Mrs. Lewis Batle, of Lake View, and Mrs. George Dewell, of Sioux City.

Funeral services were held Monday afternoon at Schmoor's funeral chapel, after which interment was made in Oakland cemetery.

DIES OF PNEUMONIA

Thos. A. McGuire, Standard Oil Driver, Passed Away Thursday—Laid to Rest in Audubon Cemetery

Thos. Albert McGuire, driver for the Standard Oil company in Denison, passed away at his home here Thursday, December 12th. Mr. McGuire was stricken with the influenza which later developed into pneumonia, causing his death.

The deceased was born Dec. 12, 1888, and thus was just 30 years of age at the time of his death. He leaves to mourn his death his wife and one daughter about two years of age.

Mr. McGuire came to Denison from Audubon only a few months ago. During his short residence in this city he made many warm friends and was

held in respect and esteem by all with whom he came in contact. He was possessed of a jovial disposition and always had a cheerful word for all.

The remains were taken to Audubon where funeral services were held at the Catholic church on Saturday, December 14th. Interment was made in the cemetery at Audubon.

The bereaved family have the sympathy of all in their hour of sorrow.

Thomas Frederick Ladehoff died at the Denison hospital Monday, December 16th, of pneumonia which followed an attack of influenza.

The deceased was born Nov. 16, 1897, being the son of Mr. and Mrs. Detlef Ladehoff. He leaves to mourn his death, besides his parents, eight brothers and sisters, namely: Ever, Henry, John, William, George, Marie, Mildred and Edward.

The early years of his life were spent on a farm in Boyer township and since his parents moved to Denison he has worked on various farms

in this locality. He was an industrious boy of excellent character.

Funeral services will be held Thursday afternoon, Rev. Wm. Frese, officiating, after which the remains will be laid to rest in the Lutheran cemetery.

PROMINENT FARMER DIES

Claus Wilhelm Henry Storm died at his home northwest of Denison on Tuesday, December 17th, the cause of his death being due to stomach trouble.

The deceased was born at Meschendorf, Schleswig-Holstein, Germany,

Oct. 4, 1870, and came to America with his uncle in 1888. On Oct. 26, 1896, he was united in marriage to Miss Wilhelmina Zage, who departed this life Nov. 3, 1900. Two children were born to this union, Ida, aged 21, and Fred, aged 20. Mr. Storm was married again April 1, 1903, to Miss Emma Finpenn, who passed away Nov. 27, 1904. Besides his two children he leaves to mourn his death one sister, who resides in Germany.

Mr. Storm was a man who held the respect and esteem of all with whom

he came in contact. He was upright in all his dealings and by hard work acquired considerable property.

Funeral services will be held from the home at 1 o'clock Thursday afternoon, Rev. Wm. Frese, pastor of the Lutheran church, officiating, after which interment will be made in the Morgan cemetery.
