Large use made of exchange. From March 15th to November 1st, a total of \$51,520 worth of livestock was sold through the farmers' exchange maintained by the farm bureau of Adams county. A car load of potatoes was also shipped in and delivered to the farmers through the exchange. That the farmers' exchange is proving its worth can be seen also from results in Appanoose county, where two car loads of potatoes and two-thirds of a car of apples were disposed of in October through the exchange. In Cerro Gordo county five car loads of onions were disposed of in October by the farm bureau, all of which graded as number one extra fancy. The last three cars netted \$1.15 a hundred, f. o. b. Mason City. When local markets in Dickinson county were unable to handle all of the potatoes and beans produced in the county, a survey of the surplus products of these and other communities was made and plans put under way by the exchange for disposing of them. Five car loads of potatoes have already been sold. The use farmers make of the exchange can be seen from the Jasper county exchange list for October that included 81 entries of articles for sale. This consisted of 91 head of pure bred cattle, 190 head of grade cattle, 176 pure bred hogs, 91 head of breeding ewes, 300 cockerels, 245 bushels of seed grain, 40 bushels of clover seed and 80 bushels of cane seed.

Sheep men to organize. Sheep men of Iowa are planning to effect a sheep and wool growers' organization in every county in the state, through the farm bureaus, to organize these counties into a state federation and reorganize the Iowa Sheep and Wool Growers' association on a larger scale. The state organization will affiliate with the Fleeces Wool Growers' association. This movement comes as the result of a meeting of wool growers with representatives from 15 states that met in Chicago at the recent international. An executive committee of one from each state was appointed to further a closer national organization. A committee of three was selected, including Carlos Fawcett of Iowa, to present the views of the sheep growers to the war industries board. T. C. Stone of Iowa State college was the Iowa representative selected for the national committee. The men voted to ask the war industries board to put an embargo on the importation of fleece and wool during the reconstruction period. They want the present wool stocks accumulated for war purposes marketed in monthly installments and amounts only as shall require 18 months to dispose of the stocks held. It is believed this is necessary to retain the confidence of the wool growers, who have increased their flocks at the unprecedented high cost and as a patriotic duty. Any reduction in present wool prices will surely result in the liquidation of many small flocks and a dangerous reduction of many others.
