Estimates of the number and value per head of livestock in Iowa and the United States, as compiled by the bureau of crop estimates and transmitted through the office of the Iowa field agent are as follows: Horses: The number of horses in Iowa Jan. 1, 1919, was 1,567,000, compared with 1,588,000 on Jan. 1, 1918, or a decrease of 21,000 head.

ers and eliminating the boarders. The total number of cows in Iowa was 1,381,000, compared with 1,405,000 a year ago; average price per head \$86, compared with \$79.70 a year ago. Milk cows in the United States have increased 167,000 head over a year ago.

Swine: The number of swine in Iowa Jan. 1, 1919, was 10,925,000, compared with 10,397,000 a year ago, or an increase of 528,000 head; average price per head \$27.50, compared with \$24.20 a year ago.
