VICTORY GIRL REPORT
Crawford county girls have done splendidly with their Victory work. Fifty-four per cent of the girls of the county pledged to give one dollar or more for the United War Work fund. Sixty-two per cent of the amount subscribed has been paid. The girls pledged \$620.50 and the boys pledged \$270.50; the girls are way in the lead, not only in Crawford county but all over the state of Iowa. The whole amount pledged by the girls of Iowa is \$100,499.72 and 74 per cent of this is paid. The boys of the state pledged \$91,537.84 and 72 per cent of this is paid. WOOL GROWERS MEET
The wool men of Crawford county met Monday afternoon in the farm bureau office and organized a county wool growers' association. The county association is a branch of the Iowa division of the State Wool Growers' association.

The purpose of this organization is to improve the marketing system of the clip. Heretofore all wool growers sold direct to the wool commission men. Many of the wool men were not familiar with the wool grading system and consequently they were at the mercy of commission men, both as to grading and price.

This year all wool men joining the association have the privilege of marketing through the state association. Each man sells his clip direct to the manufacturer, paying 2 1/2 cents per pound commission charges and the freight to the commission house and handling the wool. The National Wool Warehouse and Storage company will handle the Iowa clip.

The Crawford county wool men decided to ship co-operatively this year and to market through the state association.

The wool will be shipped by the car load from Denison. Each sack will be weighed and tagged by the county agent. The freight charges will be pro rated among the shippers.

Arrangements were also made at the meeting Monday to obtain a wool shearer's circuit was laid out so that shearing could be done quicker. All wool men who were unable to attend the meeting Monday and who wish to ship through the association should get in touch with any of the following officers of the association: Frank Slater, president; Thos. Gilbline, vice president; J. S. Quist, secretary, and Henry Hadentfeldt, treasurer.

DISCUSS HARD SURFACE ROADS

Number of Prominent and Influential Farmers Meet at County Agent's Office on Tuesday Evening

PROPOSITION MEETS FAVOR

Meetings Will be Held in Each Township in Order to Get Matter Before the Taxpayers

A number of prominent and influential farmers met last evening in the office of County Agent John Quist at the court house to talk over the new hard surface road law and come to some understanding as to whether or not Crawford county would take advantage of the provisions of this law to improve its highways.

County Engineer H. B. Fisher was in attendance at this meeting and briefly outlined the new law, after which he answered questions in a general discussion. Most of those present at the meeting expressed themselves as in favor of the hard surfacing of roads in Crawford county and were of the opinion that some effort should be made to explain the new law to the people of the county so they may vote intelligently on the proposition when the time comes.

It was decided by those present to hold meetings in every township or possibly every school district of the county and have some one thoroughly

acquainted with the new law explain it. Several farmers at the meeting stated that they had been against the surfacing of the roads until they had heard the new law explained by Mr. Fisher and are now real boosters for the improvement.

Under the new law the state and government pays two-thirds of the expense of surfacing roads of the primary county road system. One-quarter of the expense is to be borne by property owners adjoining the improvement not more than one and one-half miles away. Land owners located more than one and a half miles away from the road surfaced do not bear any of the expense of the improvement, other than that which they may pay into the state for automobile licenses.

County Agent Quist is anxious to have the proposition explained to the farmers of the county in order to find out whether or not it is a good thing. Meetings have already been called in some townships for next week.
