MRS. O ROGERS CALLED BEYOND

Mother of Mrs. W. F. Hulburd, west of Dow City, Passed Away, November 7, Aged 67 Years

CAME TO CRAWFORD IN 1872

Deceased Was Mother of Eight Children Seven of Whom Survive—Funeral Held Tuesday

Dow City, Nov. 11.—Special—On Friday of the past week Mrs. O. W. Rogers, mother of Mrs. W. F. Hulburd, residing west of town, was called to the Great Beyond, following an illness of some duration. Phoebe A. Peterson was born in Sussex County, N. J., Feb. 15, 1852 and died at the home of her daughter, Mrs. W. F. Hulburd near Dow City November 7, 1919, aged 67 years, 8 months and 22 days. In early life she moved with her parents and sisters to Muscatine County, Iowa, and later to Washington County, Iowa, where she resided until her marriage to O. W. Rogers on January 1872 after which she came to Crawford county to live where she experienced all the hardships of pioneer life. Later she moved to a farm in Harrison county, then to Woodbine where she spent the last eighteen years of her life, with the exception of a few months at the home of her daughter here. Her husband preceded her in death Feb. 5, 1917. Eight children were born to Mr. and Mrs. Rogers namely: Frank A., of Sioux City, Joe P., of Spokane, Wash., Adelle E., of Dow City, Stephen W., who died in infancy, Mrs. Alice Lohmann, of Wheatland, Mrs. Olive Hulburd, of Dow City, Mrs. Grace Thoren, of Lohrville and Mrs. Ethel McMurray, of Jessup. Besides the seven children left to mourn are six grandchildren: George A. Rogers, Harold R. Lohmann, Maurice E. McMurray, Lloyd P. Hulburd, William F. Hulburd and Robert L. McMurray. One grandchild, Eugene R. Lohmann, died in infancy.

The funeral service was held at the Hulburd home Tuesday morning, being conducted by Rev. Grant Lewis, a Methodist minister of Des Moines. The remains were taken to Dunlap where interment was made by the side of the husband and infant son. The deepest sympathy of the whole community is extended to those left behind who will so sadly miss her.
